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KENMO - You've been there.

KEN-MO, it's a name that's well known in our district. What many newcomers to the district might not know is that the names represent two people who through their energy contributed unbounded happiness in the community. **Kenneth** and **Mona Lund's** ashes are scattered overlooking the colourful arboretum of their creation.

In 1937 Kenneth Lund trekked to Himeville from his farm near Spioen Kop on the Tugela river in response to favourable rainfall figures in our Southern Drakensberg. He travelled down in his car accompanied by his parents who came down by ox wagon, his righthand man Elias Mapalala accompanied him sleeping under the car en-route. From early on Ken had been challenged. As a 5yr. old while running beside an articulated ox drawn mower with his 'umfaan' companions, his leg caught in the apparatus. A cart trip to Escourt and onto Pietermaritzburg saved him, but not his leg, it was amputated. 'Hazeledene' is still known by the locals as *Umlenze* (Leg), Ken's Zulu name.

Ken's Zulu name. Says Jack, Ken's son, "It was tough to start with, then Dad being friends with Charles Eustace who lived close by, introduced him to his cousin Mona Richardson, they married in 1939. Her mother is an Acutt so names haven't changed much in this 'neck of the woods". 80 years ago, today's Kenmo was an eroded piece of veld with a stream. Ken fenced it off to keep cattle out. At first, they planted pine trees, then there was a big fire, that's when they started today's planting beautiful trees.



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



Mokhotlong Mountain Transport Company. The Sani Pass was originally developed as a bridal path in 1913 which was primarily used as a trade route between South Africa and Mokhotlong. All goods were carried by pack mule. The aim of the business was to move freight into Lesotho more efficiently than the slow, long suffering pack donkeys. In the late 1950's one of the founders of the company, Arthur Major, drove the first tour up the Sani Pass. Over Seventy years later, his son, Charles Major who still operates these tours and owns Major Adventures."I grew up in this area and spent much of my youth on the Sani Pass when my father Arthur Major was a partner in Mokhotlong Mountain Transport (MMT). My father was involved with the building of the Sani Top Chalet while with MMT. I began driving tourists up the Pass when I was only 19 years old

Using a 'Vaaljaapie' (part- Parrafin driven tractor) and a dam scoop Ken constructed the bottom dam. The first Oaks came from 'Inch Garth' farm next door, these had originally been planted by the monks from Reichenau. Then Mona, who had a library of books on trees started importing seeds from Europe and the USA - the rest is history. When Jack and Di took over the farm in the 1970's they constructed the top dam and continued planting trees from their nursery that largely supplied the district with trees, shaping the landscape into what it is today. Di's parent's ashes are also scattered at the top end of 'Kenmo', a grandson calls it the memorial section of the park.

Says Jack," 'Kenmo Lake' had a good ring to it, it's really a memorial to his parents. It was a family decision to share what they had created with the community and it remains so to this day. Generally, people respect it and we've maintained it. We used to have a visitor's book, some interesting things in there, wink, wink, nudge, nudge, a person once wrote; 'We're from Jo'burg, we were really shocked!they didn't even steal the pen!"

A personal connection; Not long before my

Oldman, **Robin Guy** passed on about 20 years ago, I took a stroll with him around 'Kenmo'. He recalled to me how he scoured the vlei and stream that is now Kenmo, for birds eggs with his childhood mentor, Ken Blackie a bachelor neighbour from 'Inch Garth' the farm next door. Those were the war years, fatherless children latched on to the likes of Blackie an 'uncle of the veld' far away from North Africa's troubles. This year the 5th of May marks the **Himeville** & Underberg Historical society picnic now firmly an event on the calendar. It was started by Maureen Smith ,Paul Welch and Hon **Taylor** with the first picnic held on 26 April 1998 which showcases Kenmo at its best. "The first two years of the museum picnic we catered for 100 people with a buffet in the old Lapa and then someone thought of a more low maintenance way to host the event.' Paul said. "The picnic replaced the winter night parties in August in the museum courtyard that hosted the "Hairy Legged Lentil Eaters" to distract us from the winter cold, the Gluhwein also helped."

The picnic is an affordable fund-raising event which facilitates the spirit and social life of the community by bringing great grand parents and their four generations of family together in this beautifully colourful treed private park.

KAP sani2c 20th Edition - more than a mountain bike ride

From 23 April, KAP sani2c Trail riders will start their three days of riding from Glencairn Farm down to Scottburgh. There are three versions of the KAP sani2c again this year, with the Trail re-introduced as the e-bike race. The Adventure starts on Wednesday 24th April at Glencairn and finishes on Friday 26th in Scottburgh. The Race starts on Thursday 25th April but will now have a Prologue happening at Glencairn Farm the day before, where only UCI registered riders will take part in this curtain-raiser to the Race.

Michael Foster 'grew up with sani2c', and later this month the 22-year-old from Ixopo heads

to the 20th edition of KAP sani2c as a professional mountain biker with the PYGA Euro Steel team. "I just want to ride my bike fast," he says.

This motivation to be fast hit him at an early age, where, as a schoolboy sani2c volunteer standing on the finish line of day 1 at Mackenzie Club handing out Super Ms, he heard the announcer say that the record had just been broken for the first stage: "I think it was 2 hours 40 something, and I remember so clearly thinking that I would break that record one day.' Foster's family are neighbours of the Haw family in

Ixopo, and living next door to sani2c founder 'Farmer Glen' Haw and attending Lynford school, he was bound to be exposed to the excitement of the event from an early age. Lynford school is the original

beneficiary of sani2c, started in 2005 to raise funds for the school that Haw's children attended at the time. Now the KAP sani2c supports 23 different schools along its 265km route from the Sani Pass area down to Scottburgh.

Foster remembers delivering drinks to the water stations with his dad as a boy: "Once I fell asleep and fell off the tailgate of his bakkie, into the icy trough filled with Super Ms and water! From when I was in Grade R to now, the school has changed so much because of sani2c. Classrooms were built, and then a pool, and now there is a big hall, it's a different

Glen Haw says: "He lives next door to us so I see him often - every day I see him training and working very hard. My first memory of him showing an interest in riding was when he was still at Lynford, and he was lubing chains at the seconding tables at sani2c. 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BIRDING IN THE SOUTHERN KZN DRAKENSBERG By Stuart Mc Lean


The Amur Falcons spent very little time locally in big numbers. Only right at the end of their season here, did Bart Fokkens and Heather Wilson see big numbers in the Wilson's Dam area, a big gathering of possibly in excess of 5000 birds. The flock gathered for a day or two and then left. This behaviour is very different to the earlier years when they would be visible for weeks in big numbers at the Himeville

Some out of range sightings were those of the Grey-backed Sparrowlarks seen by Aldo Berruti at Sani Valley Lodge on 17 March, a group seen by Hugo Voights and Bart Fokkens at Penwarn on the same day and a group of them were seen at Dartford Farm by Kevin Fraser and Decklan Jordaan on 22 March. Chris Kelly saw a European Honey Buzzard at Goshen on 1 April.

Other good observations were of an adult Pale Chanting Goshawk on 17 March near the Polela River outside Himeville by Aldo, amazingly the same day as the Grey-backed Sparrowlarks were seen. Kevin Fraser spotted an African Crake on Dartford on the 21 March. This bird is seldom reported from here. I have seen birds near the Eustace farm Abingdon on three occasions in thatch grass along the roadside. Glen McLean photographed a pair mating there some time ago and I saw a bird with three chicks on a different date.

A Brown Snake Eagle was first seen near Mkomazana on 4 March and I have had several sightings of it since. Aldo Berruti last reported it there on the 27 March. I have since seen it over Sani Valley Lodge area on 30 March. Bart saw Verreaux's Eagle over Splashy Fen on the 29 March. I saw a Lesser Moorhen at Dieu Donne on 28 March, White-winged Tern at Reichenau Dam on the 29 March and a single Baillon's Crake in Himeville Nature Reserve on 4 April.

Margie Schleyer saw a pair of White-backed Ducks with at least four



ducklings on 4 March. Wever Dylan had Brimstone Canary in the garden, a first for his garden. Kim Fraser saw a pair of Half-collared Kingfisher at their dam. Pam Ellenberger had Green Woodhoopoe in her Underberg garden and Aldo Berruti had Willow Warbler and Violet-backed Starling in the garden.

Some late departures were Fan-tailed Grassbird I saw at Sani Valley on the 30 March. Our Buff-spotted Flufftail has remained till the 17 April, this is the



longest stay of this species in our garden, a few days shy of four months. Only the male remains at the moment, true to form the female departed first, but most years the chicks would remain long after the male departs. The reverse has happened this year. I have never seen Buff-spotted after the 28 March.

effect on the fishing. Water tempersture **ABOUT TROUT** readings of 16 degrees celsius have been recorded on some dams, and that is good So glad to say the fishing in the rivers has enough to fish without having to much stress greatly improved. The cooler weather put on the fish. Many good fish have been dropping river water temperatures into caught in both club and private water and comfortable ranges for the fish. The recent mentions of big cockfish moving into the rains also helped allot getting the water shallows. Fish seem to be feeding well and levels up. The fish were more active and bulking up before the spawn. Floating lines in many of the bigger fish moved from the the shallows acounted for many fish although deeper pools into shallower runs and pockets where they are easily targeted on dries, wets and dry/droppers. Some very good reports have come back from private and Emzemvelo waters, where fish over 50cm (19 inch) have been caught. Many fish caught in the 30cm to 40cm (12 to 16 inch) range also reported. UHTFC had 30 fish come of 28 rods. Flies being productive was various dries, Adams, Klinkhamers in black and olive as well as varios parachute emerger flies and old school Royal wullfs got fish to the net. Hoping that this cooler weather and almost perfect water conditions bring the bigger fish to show themselves for the Rivers in May festival held by UHTFC. I can not wait to hear reports of fish this last bit of the season will produce.

fishing deeper still caught fish too. As always black wooly buggers (speedcops) did well along with varius leach and tadpole patterns, Matuka in olive and black as well as Mrs Simpsons, Pancora buggers and various Dragonfly patterns caught fish. Big patters did well all over. White flies and flies tied with red stood out at some of the dams (club and private waters). UHTFC produced 69 fish from 62 rods fishing. The longest being a Rainbow of 62cm(24inch) caught by D.Parsons. As the cooler weather continues the stillwater will surely be a good alternative to rivers that are closing in little under a month. And with the fish in the shallows at that time will surely make for enjoyable sight fishing. 



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Sulenkama first came into the spotlight in 1880 at the onset of the Basutoland Gun Wars. The Cape Government had passed a Peace Prevention Act (PPA) to disarm tribes. (Basutoland and East Griqualand were then part of the Cape colony). A Qumbu magistrate by the name of **Hamilton Hope** and two of his staff were murdered at Sulenkama after they attempted to coax Kumkani Mhlontlo a local Chief into assisting colonial forces against the Basuto Gun War Rebellion. Interestingly Hope's assistant a missionary's son Alfred Davis was untouched. He fled to Shawsbury mission after the Chief who had connections with his father missionary **Davis** 'Sunduza' separated him from the other Cape colonial administration officials. This was not an isolated incident, Walter Stanford in Tembuland had his offices sacked and burnt and a Mr. Welsh the magistrate of Tsolo locked himself and companions in the jail for safety. Charles Brownlee magistrate of East Griqualand was besieged in the Ongeluksnek valley near Matatiele. In the aftermath Chief Kumkani Mhlonto was exiled to Basutoland and losing his official status, he died a pauper. Reference to much of what I am writing about can be read in **Kokstad** author **Milner Snell**'s marvelous book 'A Beautiful Country', which




Close to todays Underberg on the Ndawana river a farm called 'Bathurst' has clues as to how far repercussions of the **Basutoland Gun** War reached. It was occupied by a frontiersman Randall Walker. RW whom I have written about before, farmed on the then **Cape** side of the Ndawana river in the late 1870's. On old maps it's known as 'Walkers *Camp*'. Historical records point to **RW**'s service during the Gun wars of 1880 - 1881 and his association with **Donald Strachan** and his private army the 'Abalondolozi' that successfully kept the Basuto Gun war rebel influence from extending into East Griqualand. Walker with his men kept the Natal / East- Griqualand flank with several incursions into Basutoland. There is reference to frontier families Scott, Caroll and van Wyhe and his sons taking refuge at the Walker farm 'Bathurst' in the 1880's. Natal colonists residing near the Drakensburg mountain passes feared assault by rebel raiding parties, the Natal police mobilized under Major J. G. Dartnell. (Dartnell is associated with Himeville later on when he implemented and chose the site of the Fort which now houses the Museum.) The gathering at Sulenkama had many a political innuendo. Hamilton Hope the magistrate who had been murdered up the road from the mission was contrasted at the monument ceremony to the likes of Dr. **Paterson** the missionary doctor from Scotland, in the 'political speak'. A 'colonial oppresser' contrasted with an international 'do gooder'. The next monument to be erected will likely be to the Chief who ordered the killing of the Qumbu magistrate Hamilton Hope. A descendent, His Majesty Kumkani Zwelozuko Matiwane of the **AmaMpondomise** spoke at the ceremony. Mhlonto's people were severly dealt with after the Hamilton Hope murder and current thinking in the Eastern Cape has it that this must be contextualized and rectified. A heritage trail capable of being promoted as the Kumkani Mhlontlo Resistance and Liberation route is now planned.

The Zulu war of 1879 preceded the Gun War and the siege at Moorosi's mountain fortress in Quthing Basutoland gave the Cape colonial Government and British troops a run for their money. Other clashes with armed Basuto rebels forced the Cape government to the negotiation table and this extended to parliament in London. The outcome was that Basutoland reverted to governance directly from Britian. In effect Basutoland was de-annexed by an Act of parliament from Cape rule in 1883



What caused the Basutoland Gun War of 1880-1? Basutoland had been annexed to the Cape Colony in 1871, Taxes soared. In 1879 18 000 pounds was collected in hut tax. The Basuto had, became sullen. Following the discovery of diamonds in Kimberly in the 1870's people of all creeds and colour poured up to the mining operation. One of the main objectives of the tribal labor was to accumulate guns, their chiefs encouraged guns in lieu of wages. Cecil John Rhodes noted that natives would walk 100 miles to earn wages to buy the "white mans magic," yet he failed to emphasize that guns were the white man's major enticement for workers to come to the diamond fields. The thought of 20 000 armed Basuto had scared the colonial rulers of the Cape colony into ordering the registration of weapons and ultimately disarmament. On December 22, 1879, Colonel Griffith ordered an unpopular PPA (Peace Preservation Act) to administer Basuto and Transkeian citizens to disarm. There been opposition in implementation in Cape politics and with missionaries particularly the French missionaries in Basutoland. Tribal land had become 'Europeanized' and traditional land rights were eroding. A civil war and rebellion followed, today it's known as the Basutoland Gun War. It threatened to spread beyond the border into the Cape and Griqualand East

Basutoland in 1878 was included in the Cape Colony. Lesotho received independence from Britian in 1966 in line with Britains de – colonization process. South Africa declared its self a Republic and disassociated itself from the commonwealth at the same time. The Transkei has had its fair share of border transformations too. Nowadays the Walker Farm 'Belfast' is incorporated into KwaZulu Natal part of the Harry Gwala District Municipality, such is the dynamism of border survey and political manipulation, this recently as a result of democratic elections in 1994.

New Race Venue, same magic, at Ultra-Trail Drakensberg

Ultra-Trail Drakensberg (UTD) festival of trail running takes place from 26-28 April, with events of 160 km, 100 km, 65 km, 36 km and 25 km. Four of the five courses traverse the Giant's Cup Trail, in the southern section of Maloti-Drakensberg Park World Heritage Site. The races incorporate features of the southern Drakensberg such as Sani Pass, Twelve Apostles, Khanti Ridge, Hodgson's Peaks, Garden Castle and Langalibalele's Pass.

Spurgeon Flemington, local farmer, is the Race Director and Founder of Ultra-trail Drakensberg and established the event in 2017, though it was years in the making prior to that. A big shift this year is a change of venue, and Flemington says: "The Premier Resort Sani Pass Hotel has supported this event from the start, serving as our Race Village, and the 25 km race still starts there this year. But moving to Glencairn Farm further down the road is part of taking the event to a new level. Glencairn is a venue that's specifically built around a vision of events like KAP sani2c. They have all the infrastructure, big gathering areas, and their food halls, toilets and bathrooms are all geared for 1000 people attending an event."

Numbers will always be limited to ensure that the experience is not impacted by growing too large, and there is a cap on numbers to limit any impact on the trails. But, says Flemington: "By being at Glencairn we are able to make ultra-trail running in the Drakensberg more accessible to a wider audience. The shorter distances sell out faster, and we'd like to see some of those runners extend into the longer distances, and come back each year for a bigger challenge."

Changes to the routes have been made to incorporate the new venue, and in the longer distances, some other changes have been made to enhance the experience out on the trails. Says Flemington: "On the 100 miler, we reduced the amount of mileage in Lesotho to 27 kms, and it will be much more scenic and visually spectacular, as those 27 kms are all on the edge of escarpment and they summit the major peaks of the area all in daylight hours. We are taking the miler runners back to the Bushman's Nek side, and then on about 50 kms of the Giant's Cup Trail, where before, there was only 20 kms of Giant's Cup Trail for them. It's a spectacular trail, so I think the miler has a well-balanced route and it's very, very beautiful."

The 100 km race will start at Silverstreams Trading Post, and runners will do the entire Giant's Cup Trail, all 62 kms of it: "I think that is pretty special. Then we're going to send them up the Sani Pass road, and to the 12 Apostles Traverse, and then along the Khanti Ridge-line - that's going to be a real sting in the tail. I think the 100 km is going to be a pretty challenging run, but a beautiful, pure mountain experience."

Last year UTD hosted runners from 27 countries to run the spectacular trails of the Drakensberg, and the event hopes to continue attracting visitors to experience the majestic beauty of our mountains and surrounding areas. By Maryann Shaw

The Mountain Echo epitomises Timeless NUD, and despite the plethora of Whatsapp Groups with everything from the Weather to Lost Pets and Fibre, it is still nourishing for the soul to settle down with a cup of coffee in a patch of sunshine and read the old fashioned "Newsie." It was not too many years back, that DR GAVIN KING embarked on a lonely journey to clean up around the Vet Surgery and on his verge, on a Friday during the lunch hour. In Rwanda, everyone from the President to the Pauper participates in the clean-up and Rules and Laws are enforced. Rwanda, once a country of horrific genocide that saw over 800 000 people slaughtered, millions mutilated and livelihoods destroyed, miraculously rose from the ashes. This Phoenix is now the Jewel of Africa, with International Tourists flocking to this clean and safe country, where the laws are enforced.

Fast forward some years and the participation in NUD TIDY TOWNS led by RUTH CROUCH, has been phenomenal. This was kickstarted by DR GAVIN KING, as a lone crusader against litter. Wall Murals are going up, old signage removed, verges planted, potholes patched, dead trees removed, and most importantly, TOURISTS are noticing and are encouraged by the green shoots of the rejuvenation of NUD. BE PART OF THE SOLUTION, NOT THE PROBLEM.

It is up to the Municipality to play their part in enforcing ALL THE BY-LAWS and promoting TOURISM and INVESTMENT. RISK VS REWARD. THE SCALE USED BY CRIMINALS. By NICHOLAS CONEY.

When a criminal decides, he is going to break into a residence or business property, they always weigh up the RISK VS REWARD for each property. Criminals usually monitor a property they are going to break into before they go ahead. What they are doing at this point is looking at what you have at your premises. In our town, most of the time it is garden equipment such as brush cutters, lawn mowers, chainsaws etc. Once they have a good idea of what you have, they will then look at your security. If you have tight security, they will normally pass your property and move onto another. Criminals do not want to get caught so if they find a situation to be too risky, they will move on.

In the security industry we talk about layers of security, starting from your boundary line inwards. Always secure your fence line and driveway gate, grow flowers/bushes that have thorns on like roses. This makes it unattractive for a criminal to attempt to jump your fence as the risk of hurting themselves is higher. Make sure you have a cage over your gate motor so that it cannot be interfered with. The next step is lighting. Criminals do not like to be seen, as they prefer to move in the shadows so ensure you have outside LED lights, preferably solar powered, so they will still work during load shedding. Keep your property illuminated during the night.

The third thing that needs to be installed, are outside beams surrounding your home as this will prevent the criminals getting to your home without being picked up. As I always say, do you want to know when the criminal is inside your home or before he gets to your windows or doors?

The fourth thing is to install an alarm system inside your home just in case the criminals get past all the security measures outside.

Always ensure you have a panic remote close by. Strategically put them around your house so in the event of you witnessing something going on in your property, you can quickly alert your Security Provider. Keep your Security Company Control Room Number as a Favourite on your phone so you can get hold of them quickly.

If you live on a farm or remote property, find a room in your home that you can use as a "Safe Room" somewhere where you can lock yourself and family in and stay safe until help arrives. If you would like advice, please contact me.

Companies will be able to perform their duties far better. They need to see what lurks in the shadows, to protect their clients and themselves. There have been many instances across South Africa in the last couple of years, where Security Reaction Officers have been murdered in their cars for their firearms, mostly because the areas were not illuminated properly. If your Street Lights are not working, report them. There are members of our

Community that are fighting to get these lights fixed through the SANI COMMUNITY FORUM. We encourage everyone to get involved in reporting the Street Lights. Your safety and those walking home after dark, depend on good lighting.

Underberg and Himeville crime rate remains low, which we are grateful for. This is not to say there is no crime. There is most certainly some crime, so please continue to stay vigilant and contact your Security Providers if you see anything strange. The Woonga addicts are still milling around town, looking for opportunities. Many of them have found vacant land around Underberg where they have made little shelters for themselves to sit and smoke their drugs. If you have vacant land near your homes, please keep an eye on them and report any suspicious activity to your Security Providers. We all need to keep the pressure on them, so they feel uncomfortable and know that addicts and criminals are not welcome in our town.

In closing, if you would like advice on your Security Systems, Perimeter Security or Safe Rooms, please feel free to contact me. My goal is to ensure our Community is safe and the Residents have secure properties. Your home is your castle, protect it as such.

Microsoft has become the tutor and teacher of the world.

In February Microsoft announced plans to train 2 million people in India with Artificial Intelligence ("AI") skills. Countries and companies are ramping up investments to take advantage of new AI opportunities. The training in India, which will be delivered in conjunction with government, nonprofit and corporate organisations and communities, will help the future workforce "harness AI's potential".

According to Forbes.com this includes partnering with national and state governments to give basic and advanced AI training to 500 000 students and job seekers "in-depth AI technical skills training" for 100 000 young women and raising awareness of responsible AI use and AI – enabled careers for 400 000 students in schools in remote and tribal regions.

Nadella, a native of India who took the helm at Microsoft a decade ago, said the country is "uniquely positioned to make the promise of AI a reality, AI is in the air now. It is going to have an impact on GDP".

Microsoft will also train 100 000 developers in AI tools and technologies that will create AI fluency among India's workforce, government officials and develop AI capacity in nonprofit organisations.

Nadella said: "Its fantastic to see how India's developer community is applying our technology and tools to build the future for India and the world".

Last year Microsoft announced a GBP 2.5 billion investment to expand its next generation AI data centre infrastructure in the UK.

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Microsoft committed to doubling its datacentre footprint in the UK and training more than one million people for the AI economy. They will be given the skills they need to build and work with AI, including expanded training for people looking to start, or move into, a career in AI.

Working in partnership with multiple learning and non-profit partners, the programme will focus on building AI fluency, developing AI technical skills, supporting AI business transformation, and promoting safe and responsible AI development and use including the first Professional Certificate on Generative AI.

In November 2022 Microsoft launched its "Skills for Switzerland" and to date 630 000 people in Switzerland have gained new digital skills. In the same announcement Microsoft committed to train 10 million people by providing free access to 350 courses, six new Career Essential's Certificates and 50 000 LinkedIn Learning Scholarships.

This month Microsoft announced a \$1.5 billion investment in Abu Dhabi's G42 to accelerate AI development and global expansion. This strategic investment will enhance the UAE's position as a global AI hub and provide further opportunities for partners and customers to innovate and grow. Both companies will support the establishment of a \$1 billion fund for developers.

Also, this month Microsoft announced a US\$2.9 billion investment, the single largest investment in its 46 – year history, in Japan to expand its AI and cloud infrastructure.

Last year it announced a \$3.2 billion cloud and AI investment in Australia.

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"ADHD" Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder by Heidi Kyle

Once, if one couldn't concentrate, struggled to understand instructions, found it difficult to sit still or stared out the window excessively we were given the ruler or the wooden spoon. The teacher would carefully place her chosen weapon in a prominent position at the front of her desk and and fix the "culprits" with a beady eye.

It's good to know we now understand this condition much better. Attention Deficit Hyperactivity Disorder (ADHD) was recognized by doctor Sir George Frederic Still in 1900 who noted a "lack of .. control by children who were otherwise intelligent". In 1968 it was included in the Diagnostic and Statistic Manual (DSM) and in 2000 it was officially recognized as a condition.

Great research and evolvement have occurred since 2000. There are now many interventions available for children and adults. Many adults are diagnosed when their children are diagnosed and mom or dad realise they are just the same!

ADHD is the overarching term, there was the term ADD (Attention Deficit Disorder), but that has been dropped. There are three presentations of ADHD. First, the classic hyperactive, lack of attention. This is the stereotypical image of the young child jumping off walls and unable to focus while the teacher pulls their hair out. The second

category is what was previously termed "ADD". This is a non-attentive presentation and has the lack of concentration but is accompanied by dreaminess and a mildly nonresponsive demeanor. The third category is a combination of the two – bouts of hyperactivity interspersed with non-attentive behaviour. The third category is the most common.

There are medications that can be effective but there is a period of adjustment as the doctor will need to ensure the correct type and dosage is administered. Recently, ADHD medications have evolved and there are more options available. There are great results to be had with diet, exercise, meditation, breathing techniques, cold water immersion and scheduling changes. In childhood, the focus of parents is on concentration for school, however the condition is synonymous with emotional dysregulation. This is due to the lack of impulse control ADHD sufferers have. This is demonstrated, not just in behaviour, but in how sufferers express their emotions. They may become angry, confused, frustrated or violent. This is why it is important not just to medicate but to holistically manage this condition to keep an even keel.

Hypnosis can be highly effective as we can help clients to visualise themselves having great days, being productive, setting goals and reframing unhelpful memories of failure or feeling demeaned by teachers and parents who didn't understand. Counselling can be helpful for clients (adult and teen children) to make good decisions about suitable careers that work best for them. There is a wonderful organization in the UK called "Attention Different" (attentiondifferent.org) which helps to frame this condition positively.

Basic Fire Regulations

These regulations are a guide-line only and any decision to burn fire breaks or block burns should be based on the current daily FDI (Fire Danger Index). If in doubt contact the Southern Berg Fire Protection Officer, Kevin Webster (082 784 1818) for confirmation. Please note that Underberg/Himeville Community Watch will broadcast the FDI's every morning on UFA channels (1 to 4 and Repeater) between 06h30 and 07h00 from Monday to Friday starting on the 1st of June 2021. The FDI will also be sent out via Whatsapp and Telegram. Should the FDI prediction change radically during the course of the morning a further broadcast will be put out at approximately 10:00.

The burning periods indicated below may be extended should extreme weather conditions persist. This is at the discretion of the Southern Berg Fire Protection Officer.

- Gramoxone / tracer lines to be done in March. Burning of tracer lines should be completed by the end of May.
- · EKZN will be allowed to continue strategic block burning during Autumn.
- · Burning of fire breaks may take place on public holidays with the exception of a public holiday falling on a Friday.
- · Cut-off time for burning fire breaks on a Friday is **18:00**. · Cut-off date for burning fire breaks is 15th of July.
- · No burning of any kind may take place over a weekend.
- · Strategic fire breaks will be burnt from North to South where practical, utilizing dams, streams, roads and ploughed lands.
- Block burning of veld grazing paddocks may take place from 15th of July.
- · Burning of timber slash and open fires is not permitted from 1st of June to the 31st of October.
- · No burning of garden refuse and rubbish is permitted between the 1st of June and 31st of October.
- · Weather forecast on UFA Radio Network given daily at 06:30 Monday to Friday. A ban on burning must be adhered to! Any change in weather conditions will be broadcast when received. Dangerous FDI's for the Province will be adhered to.
- · All burns must be logged with Com-Watch on the day of burning, either by radio, phone, Whatsapp or Telegram.

Umbrella Disease By Llew Evans



When veterinary students are training each holiday they are sent somewhere to see at first hand the kind of work a vet does. For example, at various times we were sent to spend time on a farm, working with private vets, state vets and even in abattoirs. When we came back from these experiences we all had tales to tell. I clearly remember the one about diagnosing Umbrella

One of the students had been sent to spend time with a private vet in the farming district of Standerton. As they were returning to the surgery one day the vet suddenly braked next to a field of cattle.

He pointed at one cow who had her head and neck through the fence and was munching rather inquisitively on the remains of an old umbrella in the long grass.

"See that cow" he said. "Make a note of her markings. I am sure we will see her again.'

Sure enough, the following day there was a call from a farmer to see one of his cows that was unwell. The vet and the student jumped into the vets' vehicle and sped to the farm. There was the same cow, looking very uncomfortable and giving little grunts if anyone prodded or pushed against her.

The vet stood and contemplated the cow. He took her temperature. He carefully listened to her chest. He walked slowly around her, and then turning to the farmer announced "I am afraid your cow has Umbrella Disease." The farmer's jaw dropped open. Then closed. He looked disbelieving "Ag nee Dok..."

"No time to lose my friend" the vet said. "We must operate immediately." So in front of the bewildered farmer they did just that and set about the operation. They sedated the cow and shaved her side, made a long incision and opened up the rumen (the cow's stomach) and the vet placed his long arm in right up to his shoulder. He felt around a bit and then rather triumphantly produced the remains of a now very battered umbrella.

"There you are, my good man" he said, handing the umbrella to the student. The farmer's eyes bulged, his jaw opened again but no sound came out. He just shook his head and turned away.

That vet's reputation as a diagnostician was just made for ever.

Post script: It is a well known fact that cows very often will eat and swallow strange objects, often even bits of metal. These objects can then become lodged in the rumen and even penetrate the reticulum (another compartment of the stomach) with very serious consequences. Cattle vets are often called upon to retrieve these foreign objects from cow's stomachs. By Llew Evans
