


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

Memories Splashy Fen Music Festival - the early years By Paul Welch In March of 1990 Pete and Almary Ferraz

gathered with Robyn Ferraz, Bart Fokkens and Maureen Smith to celebrate their birthdays that all happen near the beginning of the year with Robyn Gawler and Paul Welch at Mount Dragon Restaurant 12 kms out of Underberg on the Swartberg road, a folly of Billy Welch's. a neo Tudor mini Castle. After many drinks Peter Ferraz was reminiscing about him and Almary going to a music festival at Woburn Abbey in England in the 1960s and his dream of having a festival at Splashy Fen Farm that had a natural amphitheatre. In retrospect we all regarded the idea as an alcohol fuelled romantic dream. Sure, enough it came together in October of 1990 much to everyone's surprise. Fortunately, Bart was involved with folk music clubs in South Africa and the next thing Splashy Fen was born. To their surprise about 1200 Splashy Fenners gathered on the amphitheatre hill that looks down onto the stage from the rocky hill just below where the pine trees meet of todays food court before you go down to the river stage. The electricity for the stage and musicians was from an old tractor driving an erratic farm generator that laid down a steady beat to the music that would sometimes stop when the tractor was being refuelled, there was no Eskom. Robin Church colleced the entrance fee

remember the Silver Creek Mountain band stepping up many times. Plagal Cadence, Tony Cox and Syd Kitchen must have also filled in. Little did we know that from these small beginnings the oldest music festival in South Africa would still be going in 2025 and that I would have a lifetime achievement of not missing any Splashy festivals except for the one limited to 350 fenners because of covid in 2021.

I remember telling Peter about my friend James Phillips from Rhodes University days should be invited to the next Splashy but once I described his genre of music, he thought it would not be in keeping with the folk theme. James had a stage alter ego Bernoldus Niemand who performed as "Bernoldus Niemand en die Government", "Die Swart Gevaar" and "en die dagga rookers" who eventually performed at Splashy

"Voelvry movement" that went on a national tour of Afrikaans musicians who were critical of Apartheid. James was acknowledged by Nelson Mandela for his cultural contribution to the change in South Africa. Splashy Fen in its early years was a homegrown event with locals providing food and other stalls including Tessa Payne who made Polar Fleece Splash jackets, Colleen and Keith Riggien had a general dealers stall named Abduls and Peter Heathcote out of an army tent that sold boerie and breakfast rolls which helped him pay for his kids education and Sue Meyer who with soft serve ice creams that sorted out her debts, Alan Louch's hot showers where the water tanks had to be checked for water levels while looking down into the showers. I made free sweetcorn fritter friendship cookies laced with dagga that I left with Dan Knight at his wood and Chicken stall for people to have. A narcotic squad member was kind enough to tell me that it was illegal for me to give friendship cookies to festival goers. Richard Robinson a nuclear Physicist who retired in Himeville offered Gluhwein laced with mountain cabbage for free from a knapsack sprayer and there was enough of a cloudy haze for people to get stoned for free. Locals were not used to seeing such unusual and exotic people coming through Underberg but all of a sudden there were Gluhwein fuelled private parties held by the older folks who went into thin air off verandahs. I remember Dave Barnett and Seamus

Thompson did not forget my fritters and neither did Tim Bekker, you can ask Dave Barnett about that.

1998 saw the biggest turnout ever of 12 000 when Landscape Prayers was the international act, and Ard Mathews did an unforgettable cover of Rodriguez's "Sugarman". John Nicholson, a local Pastor had big banners warning festival goers of the evils of Splashy Fen at the turnoff to the R600 which might have been provoked by Jennifer Ferguson's song about Lillith. In 1994 Splashy Fen happened on the weekend of 27th April now known as "Freedom Day". Pedro Carlo was director of Splashy Fen for well over a decade before Stu Berry and Impi Concepts events took charge of Splashy Fen which has now become well organised with all the necessary infrastructure that made it no longer necessary for me to eat a whole block of cheese to constipate me. Pedro passed away in February 2025, he started White Mountain Music festival. By Paul Welch

BIRDING IN THE SOUTHERN KZN DRAKENSBERG

Pam Ellenberger found a Lesser Moorhen at the entrance to Khotso on the Drakensberg Gardens road on 3 March. Unbekown to Pam, Aldo Berruti would find 4 chicks skulking with the other parent bird. Most years there is at least an immature Lesser Moorhen in the district. A pair did breed near Reichenau Dam a few seasons ago.

This year the breeding season has ended with a lot of rain, flooding grasslands and stream banks and wetlands. These occurrences tend to flush out skulkers like crakes. I saw Corn Crake on the Pevensey Road early morning in wet and miserable conditions as was the one I saw at Marutswa Forest late last year. African Crake have bred in the Dublin Vlei, with fairly regular sightings of the adults or fully grown young early or late in the day, also preferably overcast days. Glen McLean and I had Red-chested Flufftail out on the middle of the road at Ottermere on an overcast day.

It was the best year for Black-headed Canaries in all my years working the eastern highlands of Lesotho with a sighting rate of almost every trip. White-throated Canaries still remain elusive on this eastern side of Lesotho, but I have had the most sightings this season as well. Glen discovered a young, injured bird which attracted 4 other Whitethroated Canaries to join it struggling on the ground, at his feet.

The long staying Purple-crested Turaco has now been in Underberg for 8 years, first being spotted by Janet and Allen Roth in Manse Road. It has only once been heard in Himeville. One is tempted to think this bird may have been an escaped cage bird but there have been other, out of the ordinary birds from further afield, such as Narina Trogon. The Eustace's have twice had Narina trogon on their farm. It seems more logical to have Knysna Turaco here as their local population is closer, at Bulwer and Ngelebantwana Forests, but Purplecrested are not true Forest birds, they prefer more woodland type habitat. The gardens are not yet so mature as to attract many forest birds yet but may do so in the future.

Garden birds are always very special for folk. Tony and Kristel Coetzer get Fiery-necked Nightjar, a very special call especially of the bushveld areas. A really interesting sighting in a garden at Richmond, was of an Olive Bush-shrike feeding a young Black Cuckoo, reported by Wally Walker. It was reported as a Boubou, but clearly it is an Olive Bushshrike, which is a great garden bird in itself. Andrew and Patricia Poole have a regular visitor to their vehicle window at their home at Nzinga, of a mature Red-billed Ox-pecker.

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ABOUT TROUT FISHING IN

The rivers have certainly given us very little opportunity to fish them. They were full and fast most of the time and anglers had to adapt accordingly to get some fish to the net. Fishing the slower edges and eddies where the fish tend to be where they are safe from the energy depleting faster currents. The lower sections of rivers were a bit discoloured and did not produce many fish. As one moves up to the middle and upper reaches the water cleared up nicely, and even though it was fast some good fish were brought to the net. Reports of 14inch(38cm) fish being caught as well as numerous other in these upper reaches of the rivers. The number of fish being caught slowly increasing. UHTFC stats for the river show only 4 anglers fishing club beats with 1 fish to show. Flies that did well were Parachute Adams and Klinkhamers for the dry fly anglers while heavy weighted PTN, hotspot Nymphs and other Euro styled flies worked well for those opting to fish deeper, with the black perdigon standing out for hooking many fish. The coolness is already in the air and rivers settling nicely and this sure to bring along good fishing.

The stilwater temperature was still a little on the high side, but atleast dropping slightly with the cooler weather we have had. Fishing the cooler days when the water temperatures dropped a little seemed to work best. Some good reports came in among all the ones of blank days. Reports of good numbers of fish caught in the resorts around Underberg with a 6lb(3kg) fish mentioned coming from these waters. The UHTFC statistics show 8 fish caught of 34 rods. Biggest fish caught was a Rainbow Trout of 24inches(63cm) caught by Bianca Luther on a Olive Bunny Leach on private water. Flies reported to work well fooling fish were Olive Papa Roaches, Olive Red Eyed Damsels, Black Wooly Buggers, Black and Orange Wooly Buggers, Pancora Buggers and various other streamers also acounting for fish caught. The cooler weather we experiencing bringing along colder water is hopefuly going to just make the fishig pick up as we aproaching the better part of the fishing season. Remember to fish responsably, keep fish wet and handling to a minimum when practising catch and release.



You won't be seeing those US Aid 4x4's parked outside SPAR in the next four

We were on the brink of visiting a wonderful **LGBTQI**+ lonely planet destination when my namesake Donald brought it to the world's attention. I'm talking about LESOTHO'S **Sehlabathebe**. Located on a wetland plateau, below Basalt crags, Sehlabathebe is a montane grassland paradise interspersed with a unique brand of sandstone rock formations which are a treat to eye and camera, walking amongst them one transcends into a fairyland. It's a movie set! Peter Jackson could have made 'The Hobbit' there. The flowers are at their peak in February. Don Guy. - I see in the credits you were the best boy. What's a best boy in film jargon? **Jokey Aldous.** – Dog's body. **D.G.** So you looked after 'Sugar Plum,' the little white dog. J.A. Laughs... No there was an animal guy on set that did all that, it was big crew, filled the Himeville Arms for about three months. We hired houses and spread them out. You know it was in the bad old days. Black and white people had to be apart, they couldn't even eat together, not sure how my oldman did it, it was a mixed cast, he got through the hoops somehow. We all ate and drank together. **D.G.** It's 40 years ago, 1974, politically shortly before the Soweto riots. Tell us about the 'e lollipop' film locations. J.A. Mostly around Underberg, Sani Pass hotel, the waterfall, the snow scene using blown in polystyrene was filmed behind MMT where Mike Clarks old Land Rovers were parked off, nowadays Sani Backpackers. But Loteni was the main location, St Anna's mission and the Christies farm on the road up to Snowtop, that's were a village was built amongst the boulders using mud pasted onto hessian cloth,. The Pedlar store was also used. D.G. Did any local feature as actors?

J.A. Jeff Titren, I remember him walking into the wing of his plane. Ouch! **D.G.** Any scenes shot in Lesotho?

J.A. Well one scene I can remember was shot in Lesotho, to show the car accident where the boys parents were killed they pushed an Austin Minor off the escarpment near Phinong pass, you can still see the wreck to this day. I remember it was bought in Edendale for about R7000.00, it was driven up Sani Pass just how I don't know.

Well there you have it, a classic Lesotho feature movie shot in and around Underberg, and it's a classic - That's the movies!

There is a sequel too, a bit of a 'skiet en donner' made about ten years ago in Jo'burg. If you haven't heard of or seen it the 'e lollipop' movie, it tells the story of a friendship between two boys, black and white who were drawn together under strange circumstances. A cute feel good movie, the screenplay is typically South African 1970's style and technically superior to 'Gods must be crazy' shot a few years later.





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DA Urges Immediate Action to Resolve Water Crisis in Mnywaneni, Donnybrook

Water shortages. Crime. Corruption.

The Democratic Alliance (DA) is extremely concerned about the ongoing water shortages in Mnywaneni, near Donnybrook, under the NDZ Municipality. Despite numerous efforts to raise awareness and engage with the municipality and the ward councillor, the community continues to endure an unreliable water supply without long-term solutions in sight.

A community engagement initiated by DA councillors and attended by over 50 residents revealed that Mnywaneni has relied on just one JoJo tank and a mountain spring for water for the past 15 years. In winter, the situation worsens, and now, with one of the JoJo tanks broken, the crisis has deepened.

Water Office in December. However, the complaint was rejected by officials, who claimed the matter was being addressed.

Although construction of a new water catchment system, fed by an underground spring and pipeline, began late last year, the new supply currently serves only a few households via a standpipe, leaving the majority of residents without adequate access to water.

Additionally, large quantities of water pipes remain abandoned along the road leading to Mnywaneni. These pipes were purchased and delivered in 2021 with the intent of supplying water to the community, but the project has since stalled, highlighting yet

another failed initiative and the waste of taxpayer money

The DA is calling on Harry Gwala Municipality to take immediate and meaningful action to resolve this issue. Access to clean, reliable water is a basic human right, and the ongoing neglect of Mnywaneni residents is unacceptable. We demand that the municipality provide a transparent, long-term plan for ensuring sustainable water access for all residents of Mnywaneni, not just a select few.

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Basically investment return is future value over historical cost over time. So how do we maximize this equation? You will need the greatest future value over the smallest cost over the least amount of time.

Now, how do we choose investments whose inherent characteristics will automatically morph into a maximisation of the above equation?

Well you need to make sure you will end up with a large future value in the first place. The following comments and check-list will help you get there.

First, a health warning. Finding growth stocks is not easy. It will certainly consume a great deal of your time. If you are not fairly experienced, do not invest a large amount of your capital. Here is the list:


Is the management team innovation and creative? Are they honest and respected? Would the business community classify them as excellent? Management must display a high level of trusteeship for shareholders and if this is not the case any investment must be avoided.

Do they have the resources, processes and vision to succeed?

Do they complete on performance and not price?

Is the top line – revenue – turnover growing year by year? No hoof, no horse no revenue, no company! The company must have a product or services that has

sufficient potential to lead to ever increasing sales. The company does not need to show increasing revenue every year, although it is better if it does, but the revenue line must be on a growth trajectory. The revenue growth can be lumpy as new products are developed and marketed but the sales line must then show a step like increase. Therefore this growth should be measured over several years – I like to see at least five years! It is important to realise that unless a company continues to enjoy the benefits of excellent management there is no way its revenue line will grow dramatically.

Is the compound growth rate in earnings per share in excess of 20% per annum?

Does the company dominate the market and are there barriers to entry.

Is there a huge market for the product? The bigger the market the greater the probability for success.

Back to earnings. A fantastic indicator for an investment winner is a great historical track record (as mentioned above a compound growth in earnings per share in excess of 20% per annum) and current accelerating earnings growth. This combination can result in an explosive winner. In the investment industry this indicator is known as momentum.

Is the business highly cash generative and not capital hungry? Can the company increase a dividend payout ratio year on year, have enough capital to fund itself and engage in share buy backs if it wanted to?

If you can answer yes to most of these questions you have probably found a winner!

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Physical Abuse in Intimate Relationships by Heidi Kyle

What happens when relationships turn violent? The majority of victims are women in heterosexual relationships. There are many services available. However, the current vogue of gender fluidity has taken up valuable space in the public sphere and there has been less focus on this issue recently.

"I would never stay with a man who hit me!" is oft declared. I applaud the sentiment but it's not that simple. A loving husband doesn't punch his wife in the face. Physical abuse in intimate relationship builds over years This violence creeps up on woman who will have experienced other forms of abuse (as detailed in last month's article on Relationship Abuse). She may have been subjected to years of verbal denigration, isolation from family and friends, financial abuse and being manipulated to feel her version of events is false or that she is "mad" or "dumb" (gaslighting). Over time, her self-esteem is severely damaged. Sadly, physical abuse can sometimes flow from this toxic river.

There is a sense of shame and embarrassment. Due to low self-esteem. isolation and gaslighting the victim struggles to cope. She often hides physical abuse from children, and this is another factor in making her feel alone and worthless.

Children can become affected and may start

misbehaving and acting out at home or school. Ironically, the abuser will often blame the mother for being a poor mother (just another layer

in the abuse which keeps her trapped). The Cycle of Abuse is useful tool to understand this dynamic. It illustrates four phases of violence: tension builds; violent incident; honeymoon phase and then calm before the cycle begins again. During the honeymoon phase the perpetrator will often buy gifts, act very affectionately and praise the victim. All highly manipulative, so it's not surprising it takes woman an average of 7-12 attempts before leaving for good. Many women don't leave at all, and some become homicide victims after their spouse goes too far.

If your partner gets you into a "choke" hold, puts his hands up near your neck or the side of your face while in a temper or while drinking alcohol, please do everything you can to leave. It's a real sign of danger. Women don't realise how much danger they are in due to the gradual incremental creep of violence, sadly they get used to it and often say "he would never really hurt me". That is until he does.

What to do? If your husband has become physically violent or threatening violence it is important to have an escape plan. It might be a friend or family member who knows what is happening. However, if you have become isolated over time it might be the police or a responsible member of the community who you can reach out to. There are various social workers who are attached to the courts who can guide and one of the first acts of empowerment is to start gathering

these types of contacts. Women who have formulated a plan have a much better chance of escape so it's important to start exploring, if you are not in imminent danger.

LONG AGO

It seems so very long ago now when I started as a veterinary student at Onderstepoort. The Faculty was funded by the Dept of Agricultural Technical Services so the accent was very much on farm animals. We were expected to know everything about horses, cows, sheep, pigs, poultry....and dogs. Dogs were very much an afterthought and as far as the Faculty was concerned cats did not exist. They were just small dogs. We learned better in later years!!!

There were no lectures on fish or fish farming, exotics, reptiles or wildlife even though for some vets these would be a vital part of their lives. We were just supposed to wing it and hope for the best.

It is funny thinking back because there as always wildlife being treated at Onderstepoort. I clearly remember a lion being there when I was a student. What it was being treated for I have no idea but we students were fascinated by it.

Our class consisted of only 3 girls and 42 boys although later another delightful young lady named Kotie joined us. These girls were supposed to just muck in like the reast of us. No special treatment was given. It was tough for them.

After you qualified you went out into the bright exciting world all eager to get involved with the world of animals, farmers, feed lots and the like. The gaps in our knowledge we just had to try and fill in from books, older more experienced colleagues or pure luck based on using general surgical and medical principles.

When I started in my own practice in 1976 I treated quite a lot of fish, snakes, white mice and hamsters, rabbits and guinea pigs. Later when I worked in the UK I did not even recognize some other queer creatures I was presented with...animals from South America and even hedge hogs. These latter were frequent patients but very difficult to examine as they kept rolling up into a prickly ball !!! I was even presented with a couple of ferrets. No one taught us about those !

We sewed up savaged wounded wildlife like Duiker, dassies, mongooses and just did our best. And you know what? Most of them survived

Any animals going to other countries had to be given a health certificate by a private vet. I remember someone bringing me 2 snakes they were taking to Canada who needed a health certificate. I wondered if the Canadian immigration authorities were going to welcome these 2 African snakes? More likely "Not for us mate. Take 'em back where they belong!"

Most of my snake medicine was of the kraalmuir kind ie done from the other side of the room! Luckily most of the treatments involved handing out antibiotics and gentian violet for mouth infections, leaving the owner to puzzle out how he was going to apply it to the sharp end of

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the snake.

Sometimes though things got interesting. Someone from a Safari Park once brought in a python because he thought it had a sore back. He wanted it x-rayed. Well trying to get a 2 or 3 metre long python to lie still on an xray plate and say "Smile" was challenging to say the least. Finally the snake got fed up and reared up....the room emptied in a flash!!! This left the Safari Park manager dancing around it with a little blue hand towel he had grabbed off the nearby basin. After a few matador like moves he managed to drop it over the irritated snakes 'head, covering its eyes and it calmed down. Back to the xray.

I wonder what my friend Dr Dewberry the chiropractor from Pinetown would have said had I pitched up with a big python in a milk crate and asked him to do a few manipulations? If he tried to grab it by the head and do that "Crick crack" manoeuvre of theirs he might have had a problem. I wonder what he would charge??

Some of the lecturers at OP seemed determined to make the students' life difficult. One was a very gruff older surgery lecturer. Everyone was nervous of him. One day he decided to demonstrate to the students how to neuter a male cat. One of the nursing sisters in the dept volunteered her cat for the op. But now he is showing off. He drapes the anaethetizes cat in sterile drapes, swabs the whole area liberally with alcohol and makes the first incision in the scrotum. As always happens when you cut the skin there are a few small blood vessels that bleed. He reaches for the hyfrecator. A hyfrecator is like an electrical pen. When you push the button sparks jump out and seal off minor bleeders.

As he pushes the button, sparks fly out and ignite the alcohol !! There are flames and smoke. The Afrikaans nursing sister who as watching starts yelling "Jy brand my kat, jy brand my kat !!!" as Dr X is frantically trying to beat out the flames with his hands. The students of course thought this was the best thing they had seen in years. Luckly apart from a few singed

drapes no harm was done.
