On July 26th, 2025, the mighty Drakensberg mountains overlooking the Southern Drakensberg town of Underberg will once again become the majestic backdrop to the Underberg Gran Fondo. The beautiful setting has earned the Underberg Gran Fondo the reputation as the most beautiful cycling event in the country, and this is equaled by the passionate desire of the local community to organise an event that matches the spectacular surroundings.

Underberg in July is well-known for the Underberg Gran Fondo which draws the best gravel riders to the village nestled in the foothills of the Drakensberg Mountains. There are a choice of three races **140km**, **94km and the 45km** Tour de Farms provides a perfect introduction for those testing their legs on a gravel bike. Easier and more manageable for the average riders, the route still provides the stunning scenery without many of the more testing sections of the route.

Sometimes it is a thankless job, hugely stressful, especially in a small town where many of the cases are people known to the paramedics. The Country Women help by manging our annual Christmas donation drive. These monies were used to upgrade our equipment and insure all our items.

The past year we have bought two new hospital beds R19000 each; a few new wheelchairs and a new portable oxygen unit R32000 as well as some smaller items.



LINCOLN. There are extraordinary times unfolding in the United States which is reflected by great volatility, as 10 million people turned out in protest against a government that is perceived to have strayed from their enshrined Constitution.

In South Africa, we too have a Constitution, and closer to home, a Municipal Structures Act, which guides us to what we should, and must, expect from our Municipality, which we pay for. Pessimism is our yardstick of the quality of the municipal services that we will accept. Complacency creates an environment where poor service delivery thrives and the lack lustre performance by Municipalities is tolerated, and hence continues, unabated. NUD does not have 10 million residents to protest, but we should have more than a handful of dedicated residents that are fighting for the service delivery for all our residents. We need to shed the robes of complacency and stand united and be far more vocal in demanding a far higher standard of service delivery, otherwise our municipality can only assume that all the residents are content with their performance.

WATER: Water issues continue to dominate the bulk of the complaints as we shift from one crisis to the next. Recently, a few Commercial properties were not only switched off in Underberg, but their Pre-Paid Water meters were physically removed. According to the powers that be, accounts had been sent out and owners warned about debateable amounts owing, and the consequences thereof. Unfortunately, owners had never received these accounts which had been emailed to previous owners, or in some cases, unknown persons. Fortunately, an urgent interdict through the courts was avoided, and sense prevailed, with the meters being reinstated.

A few dedicated residents coordinate the water leakages and outages reports that are received through a social media group, but they do not have the capabilities to get the Harry Gwala Plumbing Teams to physically repair the leaks. Hence, abusing and criticising these dedicated volunteers when leaks are not fixed timeously, is both disingenuous and unnecessary. A resident in Thomas Street has had damages to his property due to a burst pipe outside his property. For over 6 weeks this has been reported but the Plumbers chose to turn up on a Friday at the start of a long weekend to sort this leak out. After turning off the whole of Himeville due to the lack of any information on shut off valves or the reticulation system, they then decided that the job was far to big for a Friday and left.

The municipal Manger was again noticeably absent for the 2^{nd} time in 3 years. To dictate that only 5 hands be taken and 3 minutes per hand, allowed, so 15 minutes in all, to express views and ask questions, is ludicrous to say the least. It demonstrates just how scared the civil servants are of being questioned. Anyway when the questions are asked, they are not answered properly either, and in most cases ignored. To be presented with pages of numbers, that don't even add up, and hidden agendas, regarding specifics, does not go unnoticed.

The mayor was unable to coherently read the budget, jumping from page to page. It demonstrated a complete lack of understanding or comprehensive of the task at hand. This was plain for all to see. And then to admit that the task of replying to emailed questions, put to her, was too big a task for her to handle. So, to solve the issue she said she decided to just not attend pre-arranged meetings, and skipped 3 of the 4 without any apologies too. This once again speaks volumes about competency levels within the municipality, starting right at the top.

Snide comments regarding the meetings with Dr NDZ herself, without knowing the full context should best be reserved until the facts are known too.. The same goes for road works and many other issues which you have consistently refused to address, despite claims to the contrary last night.

The fact that the people at the head of the table spent more time playing on their phones than paying attention, did not go unnoticed either. Once again this demonstrated the absolute highest form of disrespect, we have all become accustomed to. It was there for all to see.

and deliver this water to the Underberg Low-Cost Village despite the Mayor saying that everyone must pay for water and hence he has installed meters at every plot in the two villages. The Mayor failed to answer the question as to where all these tankers go to and why they block Reservoir Crescent Road and prevent residents accessing their properties.

TOWN PLANNING: It was inspirational to attend a well conducted and transparent Town Planning and Precinct Meeting conducted by Mr Sizwe Gwala. The challenges facing the Town Planning Department are numerous, but with a Public/Private fruitful partnership, underscored by good communication and transparency, no problems are insurmountable. With the towns growing exponentially, it is essential that the Aesthetic Committee is reinstated so that Building Plans are inspected by appointed Residents and the Planning Department simultaneously, before the plans are passed, to preserve the ethos of our villages and protect the environment.

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BIRDING IN THE SOUTHERN KZN DRAKENSBERG By Stuart Mc Lean

The Wattled Cranes appear to be doing well not just in the province, but locally as well. Several pairs are on the nest and at least two pairs have tiny chicks. The dams built many years ago on farms all over the area would probably have flooded the wetlands. After many decades of the grasslands around some of these dams being flooded there may have been sufficient time for these areas to become sedge habitats slowly as they replace the grass tufts, which live for decades or more in normal conditions. Sedge corms are a staple diet for Wattled Cranes. Why are these cranes suddenly using areas they have not used before? Either it is a population problem and young birds are looking for marginal areas to breed or the habitat has only now become suitable for this species.

Krissi Scott rescued a Grey Crowned Crane near the Polela River. She assisted by taking it part of the way to FreeMe, meeting one of the FreeMe team on the way, where they say the bird had symptoms of a vehicle collision. The bird had concussion, blood in the eye and bruised leg and wing. The FreeMe team does fantastic work with rehabilitation, hopefully this will be another one of their success stories. A great pity that the wind and snow effects prevented Wade Whitehead from giving the local Sani Wildlife group a talk about a Wattled Crane on 11 June. Hopefully the Sani Wessa will re-schedule this talk.

Domestic cats remain one of wildlife's most serious predators. It is not just birds, but small mammals, reptiles and amphibians also pay the price. Many people downplay the problem, but consider the number of humans in the world and how many have not one cat but more. The density of domestic cats is considerably higher in an area compared to the number of wild/ natural/indigenous cats, as these cats are territorial and will not tolerate other cats. I know of people who belong to wildlife organisations who have numerous domestic cats running free on their property. I went to Mtunzini some years ago and stayed at a forest lodge in beautiful indigenous forest, but every lodge had feral cats around them, I will not return to that lodge! It was estimated that more than 1.3 million birds are killed by cats in the USA annually. I visited a Blue Swallow destination and domestic cats would follow me. This is one of South Africa's rarest birds. How can one be so casual about cats!!

Consider the mouse infestation on Marion Island, where they were accidentally introduced by sealing vessels in the 1800's. The idea of the conservationists in the 1940's was to introduce domestic cats to solve the mouse problem. That did not work as it was easier for the cats to predate the birds nesting there. At a massive cost the last cat was removed from Marion Island in 1991. Now the problem is still the mouse infestation. To save the islands birds will cost millions. Let's hope when they try with rodenticide it will work. New Zealand has had amazing success with this method. Sadly it is this or extinction for several birds. Let's not leave things till it is so late!



ABOUT TROUT FISHING IN UNDERBERG

Good to say that this report is not all bad news. Since last report the rivers have closed and season only reopens 1st of September if conditions allow. But this far the rivers are looking in very good shape and hopeful that they will stay so untill opening.

The stillwater has seen a big increase in fish being caught. Many reports both from anglers fishing clubwater as well as private and resorts have shown that the fish are moving into the shalows where they preparing to spawn. This makes for good sight fishing once the fish are found. These "spawning" fish tend to congregate in the shallower areas of the lakes and dams where some sort of bottom substrate preferbaly gravel attracts them. Though preocupied with spawning they are still catchable using various methods. If using streamer it is best to use bright coloured flies with the use of a faster strip to hook the fish that strike at the fly out af aggression rather than to eat, spitting it out much faster once touched. The faster strip increases hook up rate. Using indicators or dry flies with small nymphs on a dropper work just as well. For those that do not frown upon

fishing egg pattens dropping one below a indicator works good too. Biggest reported fish caught was from UHTFC waters. A Rainbow Trout of 65cm caught fishing a natural muddler minnow on a very short leader. This is just the start of long awaited season that surely going to produce some good days fishing. Hope that we will have more statistics on fish caught as the season continues. Aged 82 Graham recently passed away in his sleep. Towards the end of his life Graham Root made many a pilgrimage to the valley of his youth. The Underberg and Himeville Historical society, was lucky to catch him 'in the flesh' and 'on form' at Lotheni a year ago - Very special. We sat, an attentive bunch, in a comfortable semi circle and listened in awe to the stories of his ancestors and his Lotheni childhood.

Here's one hard to forget.... Sent out to fetch some sheep one day it began to snow, on the return trip with his bearings lost in the whiteness he climbed onto a rock with his dog because he was afraid of the jackals. It was a cold night out and when the cloud lifted in the morning he found himself only a few hundred metres from home.

He was the Grandson of the original Lotheni farmer settler John Root a sawyer from Deepdale and the son of **Peter Root** who created the present Lotheni hutted Camp after the farm was expropriated for conservation. Graham had a quintessential rural childhood, fishing rod in hand, dog and plenty of Zulu umfaan mates from whom he acquired linguistic skills that stood him in good stead. Even in his old age he was fondly known to the present day conservation staff of Lotheni as 'Mkonto' - 'the spear' I quote from his book - Roots of a Game ranger;

We learnt from a very young age to stick fight, which is the traditional Zulu sport, and we soon had a pile of sticks in our bedroom, won in 'battle'. At Underberg school he was regularly canned for addressing the headmaster in Zulu.

At his memorial service held some weeks ago in Howick, friends annocdoted stories from his schoolboy days.

Quote : The Macleans they were a crazy bare foot bunch, never wore shoes – they were wild - rough, but gee, there was family over the valley and a guy called Graham Root, his dad puts him on the ox wagon sends them to the station to deliver produce.

Graham went on to Ixopo High and is remembered as mischievous and competitive but beyond his toughness having a gentle side. His cross country records took years to be broken. One of his

school mates recalled ;

• 'if we'd been asked who would be the most unlikely Speak to me about Price to write a book it would have been Graham – he was an outdoor do'er but we would be proven wrong. His Childrens books and others on the exploits of a game ranger are testament to his grit and talent beyond the practical life he led. His books are on sale at the

I know there are those who didn't like the Marigolds in the green bins, but they at least added a pop of colour and cheerfulness. However, they will soon have to go. The potholes at the butchery were repaired a while ago but three bags with the gravel were left by the road repairers. Easy to take away but one just wonders how long they will remain there now!!! That whole area is so scruffy and untidywire fencing being taken by the street mechanics, building materials lying all haphazardly and disorderly. Folk passing going to the two schools, the two churches and to the doctor must pass this ugly spot in our village daily. The Street Light remains like "The Leaning tower of Pisa" which we have reported and requested for it be removed on numerous occasions. We have tried to help enhance this area with two murals: the Nguni one and the abstract mural, both credits to Don Guy.

ODDS AND ENDS: The two Tidy Town chaps and I have plugged away with many small things: The creosoting of some of the poles, painting the small concrete street signs (I will redo the lettering as I am trying to get some stencils), brush cutting and neatening the banks and edges below the big taxi rank and clinic, removing scrub vegetation, cutting all the dead cannas in the park etc....so we do sweat the small things and so folk who do kindly donate, you have some idea of where the money is being utilised.

For the Underberg School, we systematically felled and removed the lower branches of all the many trees lining the main road into the village and so sought to give a lovely vista into the school. Also, we have been tasked to do the Himeville Anglican Church Garden so these are private jobs, but it all helps to beautify the villages. Not so with Puma Garage in Himeville - a real eyesore and nobody can tell us if and who has bought it. The Magistrates Court too still has not had its carport repaired since that fatal snowstorm in September last year. MAINTENANCE: With the growing season having now ceased, there is no longer any need to brush cut and mow. So, I have encouraged the municipality to send in an environmental team, using pangas, slashers, long arm saws etc. to cut down bonga-bongas, young gums and wattles growing in the entrance to Underberg, also in the entrance to and in the heart of Bulwer. She is the younger sister to Underberg as is Himeville - all need to get these invasive plants under control. Trish Maphanga is taking up the challenge and planning for a work party on Thurs and Fri 19th and 20th to remove the Black Locust plants at the back and alongside the newly painted red roof of the

The Battle of INdawana January 1881

War with the Basutos broke out in 1880 and this spilled over into East Griqualand. A magistrate and his two assistants were murdered. Hordes of Basuto rampaged through the country and were expected to attack Kokstad. **Donald Strachan** and his **Abalonolosi** 'The protectors' took command and attacked the Basuto driving them back over the mountains. Further north the Basuto were making threatening movement on the Natal border. On the **Ndawana River** (about 20km from today's **Underberg** on the road to Kokstad) in those days the border of Natal and the Cape colony there existed a pioneering community of, the most interesting for me ,one Randal Walker who had moved there from Highflats.

Archive sources record **Walker** in charge of native levies and associated with **Donald Strachan** on the Cape side and **Major Dartnell** of the Natal Mounted Police on the Natal side. Archie Scott from 'Brachan', old van Wyhe and his sons from 'Glencoe' and John Caroll who farmed at 'Umgano' all joined forces with Walker at 'Bathurst' still known as Walkers Camp to protect themselves and wait for the Basuto's. The Basuto attacked from a hill behind the house shooting one of the Zulu occupants and driving off a lot of cattle. Walker and his men pursued them, recovered the cattle and drove the Basuto over the Drakensberg.

The wives and family of these men fled to Underberg where stayed at a kraal of a wealthy Zulu (*probably Sakhayedwa whose kraal was located below Hlogoma*)

The Honourable The Colonial Secretary

I have the honour to report that On the 16th ? the rebel Basutos about 250 strong, attacked Mr. Randal Walker, Killing one of his men, and carrying Off some of his horses and his sheep And goats. After an hour and a halfs fighting the Basutos were driven back into the Berg and all the stock re captured. The Basutos carried off their killed and wounded.

This report written from Highbury Near present day Bulwer by Jackson.

WINNING STOCK MARKET STRATEGIES

OBLIQUITY: ACHIEVING YOUR GOALS WITHOUT INTENDING THEM * EXTRAORDINARY PROFITS FROM ORDINARY SHARES * WINNING STOCK MARKET STRATEGIES *

The term "Obliquity" was first coined by Sir James Black, a British chemist, who was also a Nobel Prize winner, and whose research led to billions of extra profits for ICI. Black realised that goals are often best

achieved without intending them. John Kay, a British economist, takes this

principle further in his fantastic book : "Obliquity : Why Our Goals Are Best Achieved Indirectly".

He argues that we are kidding ourselves if we think that our deft planning and control will lead to our intended outcomes. The world is too complex for that. Given that rational control is hubris, is it not better to have qualitative rather than quantitative goals.

High – level objectives – living a fulfilling life, creating a successful business, producing a distinguished work of art, are almost always too unprecise for us to have any clear idea how to achieve them. That doesn't imply that these goals lack meaning or the capacity for realisation. We understand their meaning and realise them by translating them into intermediate goals and actions; we interpret and reinterpret them as we gain knowledge about the environment in which we operate. That is why successful approaches are oblique rather than direct.

"Happiness is not achieved through the pursuit of happiness. The most profitable businesses are not the most profit-orientated. The wealthiest people are not those most assertive in the pursuit of wealth. The greatest paintings are not the most accurate representations of their subjects, the forests most resistant to fires are not the ones whose foresters are most successful in extinguishing fires. Soviet planners managed the economy far less successfully than the adaptive, disorganised processes in market economies".

John Kay explains that during Bill Allen's time as head of Boeing from 1945 to 1968 it developed the 737, the most successful airliner in history. When it began development of the 747, which would define commercial aviation for decades, a non –

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executive director questioned the planes profitability. He was given the cold shoulder, because management sided with the engineers and not the accountants.

Boeing created the most commercially successful aircraft company, not through the love of profit but through the love of planes. The oblique approach to profitability delivered spectacular results.

Boeing lost its way when new CEO Phil Condit emphasised cost reduction and shareholder value. And we all know about the disasters – the crashes of the Boeing 737 Max – 189 dead on Lion Air Flight 610 and 157 dead on Ethiopian Airlines Flight 302 and the latest crash – Air India Boeing 787. The share price has suffered a spectacular collapse.

Johnson & Johnson is another example. Johnson & Johnson's mission, written by Robert Johnson himself in 1943 reads as follows

As Sir James Black observed, it's only in pursuing higher – level objectives that you create an organisation that is motivated to outperform. Profit can only come as a result of the greater meaning and value that you provide the world and the people that work for you.

I think the greatest example of Obliquity is that of King Solomon. God asked Solomon what he wanted from him and Solomon asked for wisdom so that he could best serve his people. Pleased, God personally answered Solomon's prayer, promising him great wisdom and wealth because he did not ask for self-serving rewards like long life or the death of his enemies.

I believe the principle of Obliquity is most useful in life and in investing.

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Cognitive Dissonance by Heidi Kyle

Following on from the article on "Gaslighting" last month we will focus on cognitive dissonance which is one of the effects of being gaslighted and manipulated.

Cognitive dissonance is one of the most influential concepts in psychology, describing the mental discomfort we experience when our beliefs, attitudes, or behaviours contradict each other. This psychological phenomenon affects everyone and plays a crucial role in how we process information, make decisions, and maintain our sense of self.

The term "cognitive dissonance" was coined by social psychologist Leon Festinger in 1957 in his book "A Theory of Cognitive Dissonance." Festinger developed this theory after studying a UFO cult that predicted the world would end on a specific date. When the prediction failed, instead of abandoning their beliefs, members doubled down and claimed their faith had saved humanity. This observation led Festinger to theorise that people experience psychological tension when holding contradictory beliefs and will go to great lengths to reduce this discomfort.

The word "cognitive" refers to mental processes like thinking and reasoning, while "dissonance" comes from music theory, describing the harsh, unstable sound created when conflicting notes are played together. Together, they capture the mental "discord" we feel when our thoughts don't align.

Cognitive dissonance manifests in countless ways throughout daily life. A health-conscious person who continues smoking experiences dissonance between their knowledge of smoking's dangers and their behaviour. They might resolve this by downplaying health risks, emphasising stress relief benefits, or promising to quit.

In relationships where one partner is gaslighting the other, the victim will experience cognitive dissonance. Often the victim struggles to rationalise their partners manipulation and they will often make up new beliefs, change their behaviour or even slip into a fantasy world to cope.

People might stay in unhealthy situations by minimising problems or emphasising positive aspects, creating internal justifications for choices that contradict their stated values about self-respect and well-being.

In politics, political supporters will often explain away behaviours of their leader which contradict their stated values.

While cognitive dissonance is natural and sometimes unavoidable, several strategies can help minimise its negative effects. The most effective approach is developing selfawareness—recognising when you're

experiencing dissonance and honestly examining the conflicting elements.

Sometimes just acknowledging that your beliefs maybe wrong or incomplete makes it easier to change views when presented with new information rather than dismissing contradictory views.

If you can change your environment so you can be exposed to different viewpoints rather than echo chambers that reinforce your current thinking. It is important in relationships to allow other perspectives and not be defined only by a partner. This can go a long way to managing gaslighting and manipulation and isolation.

If you find yourself in an ongoing state of cognitive dissonance and you can trace that feeling to a person in your life it maybe time yo consider responsibly disengaging.

If you are experiencing a general form of cognitive dissonance, it can be helpful to embrace the discomfort of uncertainty. Not everything needs immediate resolution.

Understanding cognitive dissonance doesn't eliminate it entirely, but awareness of this mental process can lead to more honest self-reflection and better decision-making in all areas of life, especially relationships. Next month we will focus on responsible disengagement.

This is a well-deserved honour; we can be justifiably proud of Simon. HO Fundraising recently included manning two aid stations for the Giants Cup Trail Event held between the 23rd and the 25th of May. The big entry kept SDHO members busy, assisting at the Swiman and Cobham tables. Conditions were ideal for runners, but accidents still happen. HO Simon Vickers (also a Mountain Rescue volunteer) was at the Swiman table when a report came in about an injured female runner. SDHO members at the table swung into action, with Mike Bloom driving his trusty LandRover with the EMS medic as close to the hurt competitor as he could get, while Simon ran further to find her. He then carried her on his back for more than a kilometre back to the waiting LandRover, which transported her to Swiman. She had a badly swollen ankle, possibly a break or severe sprain. Simon's exemplary action has been recognised and commended.

Eland Management. With the goal of better understanding the movement of Eland herds and individuals within the region and making informed decisions on population management, Chris Kelly from The Wildlife Act, Ezemvelo, and the Southern Drakensberg Honorary officers have plans to GPS-collar approximately six eland in the southern berg. The Ezemvelo capture team will be in the area in June / July and will focus on herds at Bushmans Nek and Cobham as well as two resident herds outside the Park. All landowners in the areas will need to agree to the capture, in case Eland move from one property to another. And there is a shortfall of R78k needed for helicopter flying time; any funds would be appreciated.

Poisoning is suspected in the case of a dead Secretary Bird recently found on local farmland. HO Rosanne Clark nobly transported the dead bird to Free Me Wildlife in Howick, where a necropsy was performed. Unfortunately, the results could not show conclusively if it died as a result of poisoning by insecticide, or not. These magnificent, endangered birds need our protection.

This month I thought we should give some thought to horses and their incredible connection with people. I recently read of a horse in France names Peyo that has an affinity with sick people. He is taken on regular visits to the local hospital where he walks down the corridor, stops outside a particular door and lifts his foot. His handler then opens the door and he goes in and bonds with the sick patient inside. Apparently he has brought a calming influence and comfort to some very sick patients who are really struggling.

A couple of years ago I read an article in the local newspaper of a lady Springbok endurance rider who lived on a fam near Ficksburg. Here she kept her Arab horses between competing in events.

At one point she travelled over to Canada where she learned of a program where horses and people bonded. She was so impressed she came home and turned all her horses out on to the mountain, saying "Go and be wild horses. I am no longer going to feed you, vaccinate or stable you". This must have surprised her much loved string of horses.

What she now does is run a B and B in conjunction with time spent with the horses and doing workshops for people with stress, health or emotional problems.

I was fascinated by this and my wife and I booked a few days at the farm, tough not to do the workshops. When she learned I was a vet and wanted to see her horses she agreed to take us out. So late one afternoon we headed out in her bakkie to the foot of the nearby

mountain. We could se a number of horses dotted around on the slopes. She first warned us not to talk to the horses, touch or try to stroke them or offer any tidbits. She told us to walk a short distance away from the bakkie, then just stop and wait. This we did.

We could see the horses observing us and gradually they moved down off the mountain and came closer and closer. There were about 12 of them About 4 or 5 horses came really close, the others just encircling us. The 2 horses began nibbling my sleeve moving down my arm and then nuzzled my palm. It absolutely thrilling !

After a while she said to us "Now move away and head slowly back to the bakkie." This we did but the one horse would not leave me alone and followed me all the way back to the vehicle. Later she said "It was extraordinary that that particular horse picked you." I felt very privileged.

Apparently different horses pick out different people with a variety of problems, but they all come away feeling refreshed from their encounter.

Recently through GCAW I had a little experience with a sad grey horse and her foal. She was in terrible condition and had a piece of wood stuck deep in the muscles of the shoulder. GCAW arranged for the local vets to operate and remove a big piece of wood. She then went to a farm near Richmond with Jean Brown for some much needed TLC. However the wound did not heal completely and required a second operation. This time the wound healed beautifully and the horse blossomed before being returned to its owner.

Please Be Vigilant For Rabies and Foot & Mouth Disease

As a non-writer type, I can assure you that writers block is a real thing. After a few months of trying to get a newsletter out on time, it finally got me. Zero inspiration. This is possibly from the stress created by our current "groot gevaar," foot and mouth disease (FMD). After a brief discussion with David Forde this last week on the subject, it was clear that irrespective of which way forward we choose; the disease is affecting us, and we need to help educate as many people as possible on the impact it has on agriculture.

It has been months since I updated you on the happenings at Reichenau Mission. They have worked extremely hard to fence key areas of the farm and plant a large area to maize. With what Guy Taylor estimates to be approximately two hundred tons of maize at the mission, there is obviously a need to dispose

of the grain profitably. Guy Taylor has offered to purchase the crop if a few concerns are dealt with. Negotiations are well advanced, and we should be seeing a combine harvester at Reichenau Mission again, after a long absence.

This being the same story for Nkwezela. After a few meetings to steady the ship, we appear to be back on course. The threat of a "big stick" sometimes helps to get people motivated.

Work has been continuing in our neighbouring communities. Regular training sessions at dip tanks is on-going. The current schedule allows for two sessions per month. At this rate we would have covered our local dip tanks by November this year. As mentioned earlier, FMD is a major topic. Our communities rely heavily on livestock, and this disease would cripple their ability to generate an income. And possibly affect the affordability of other protein sources. Thank you to our three Agri stores, TWK (Pat Dlamini), Agrimark (Abongile Sithole) and VKB, for their support in these sessions.

Sheldon Kok (VKB) has taken to supplementing our protein on these days with excellent selections of rump steak. While Pat Dlamini and Abongile Sithole ensure we are always well hydrated. The Department of Agriculture (Vet) in Ixopo has been assisting as best they can. And have attended a few sessions to explain their role if suspect cases of FMD are reported.

Although it is clear that they are under-resourced at this level. I do believe they took blood samples from local commercial herds as part of a sampling exercise. Small interventions can make a large impact. After the rabies case on Bushman's Nek Road, the Ixopo vet technicians assisted us with an inoculation drive at West Islay farm

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
on the Swartberg Road. Mike Willment initiated this. Approximately thirty animals were vaccinated. This helped to allow the Giants Cup Animal Welfare (GCAW) ladies to tackle other areas as well. Unfortunately, more cases appear to be popping up. SAPS meetings still happen, albeit irregularly. Our last meeting discussed a dog poaching incident, and we are hopeful that more support is forthcoming. Remember to report all crimes. Follow ups are difficult if there are no references.

To end this edition, I would like to ask everyone to be extra vigilant. Rabies is a deadly

from the adjacent loose box allowing a white faced Colin to escape. We all had more respect for horses after that.





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
