

New Mountain Bike Challenge Cements

Underberg as Unrivalled Hub for Adventure

Sport Athletes Running Man Adventures (RMA) is thrilled to announce the launch of the Sani Pass Time Trial (SPTT), a new mountain bike challenge set to take place on Saturday, 25 October 2025. Entries for this unique event

opened 2 July 2025, visit www.sanipasstt.com to enter. Nestled in the breath taking Southern Drakensberg, Underberg is a renowned natural backdrop for various adventure activities, hosting major events such as the Sani2C, the Drak Challenge Canoe Marathon, RMB Ultra-trail Drakensberg and Sani Stagger endurance races. The introduction of the SPTT further solidifies the region's reputation as a premier destination for outdoor enthusiasts.

SPTT offers a truly distinctive experience: a 21km ascent of the iconic Sani Pass, often referred to as the "holy grail of all Southern African mountain passes" and the gateway to the "Roof of Africa." The race will commence from Premier Resort Sani Pass at an altitude of 1450m, culminating at the finish line on the edge of Lesotho at 2876m, involving an impressive climb of nearly 1500m.

"The South African MTB calendar is definitely crowded, but there's nothing quite like a time trial up the Sani Pass, so we feel we're offering something truly unique," says Spurgeon Flemington, owner and race director of Running Man Adventures. "We also wanted to provide a race where the challenge is very real, but the time commitment isn't excessive, allowing riders to enjoy a fantastic weekend on their bikes without needing extended leave or time away from family."

This pure time trial format will see riders setting off at timed intervals with a strict no-drafting policy. The clock will stop as each rider or pair crosses the timing mat at the summit. The return journey down the Pass will be an untimed neutral zone, encouraging participants to safely take in the magnificent surroundings of the Maloti Drakensberg World Heritage Site, with its unparalleled vistas and thin air.

First-timers to Sani Pass can expect to be immersed in a special landscape, while experiencing the extreme challenge of the ascent. The route comprises 13km of tar to the South African Border Post, followed by 8km of lung-busting gravel to the summit.

The Sani Pass Time Trial will feature four race categories: MTB, E-Bike, Gravel Bike, and Single Speed, with options for riders to compete solo or as a team of two. The inaugural event on Saturday, 25 October 2025, will see the first riders depart at 07:00, with the last by 09:00. Start times will be allocated once entries close, with Single Speeds leading the charge, followed by Gravel Bikes, Mountain Bikes, and E-Bikes. All riders are expected to be back by 13:00.

Premier Resort Sani Pass will serve as the race base, hosting the start, finish, prize-giving at15:00, and a celebratory spit braai and after-party for all entrants. On-site accommodation at the hotel will be available for booking two weeks after race entries open.

"It's always motivating to bring people from all over SA and beyond to share in the beauty of the Southern Drakensberg," adds Flemington. William Paterson Small

25-07-1924 – 21-06-2025 nearly 101

Bill's staff at Cobham called him aptly and affectionally Uvemvane' – Butterfly. Typically a Zulu name often describes personality and character - with a bounce in his step, he strides across the African veld with deviations, curiosity and intent.

Born at Broughty Ferry, Dundee, Scotland 24th July 1924 he lived and explored wild places around Dundee. He immigrated with his parents to Durban South Africa 1936 aged 12. They lived in Stellawood where he attended the Junior School and later Glenwood high school. He left school early to assist Dr Vincent Wager on Tobacco Mosaic Virus, he also caught frogs and chameleons for photographing for his books. In his spare time he did Cycle racing on a fixed wheel bike and once cycled to Bulwer. He also went to night classes as he had promised his Mother, before she died at 42, that he would get his matric.

The war was on so as soon as he turned 18 he signed up. He was on whalers on submarine lookout up and down the West Coast and down to the Roaring Forties. Then from Durban up to Mombasa escorting the war ships. After the war he tried Stellenbosch but as his professor said "If he'd applied as much energy to his studying as climbing Jonkershoek he would have passed.

He then did a year of Forestry Practical at Spitzkop in the Transvaal. On the way back he did part of the Grand Traverse 'solo', from Mont Aux Sources to Cathkin Peak. At Saarsveld near George he qualified as a Forester. His practical was done in Knysna where he collected data for research.

He met Alta who was teaching in Knysna but was sent to Northern Rhodesia to start a plantation outside Ndola. He started writing to Alta and after a visit by her, in his 6 months leave (every 2.5 yrs) he went down and proposed to her, they were married in 1955 and travelled to Scotland and toured for his long leave. Helen was born in Ndola and later Wells in Kitwe where he was then transferred to. 1965 Zambia became independent. He stayed on to train his staff and transferred in 1966 to South Africa, Stutterheim to do orientation as a forester, Phillip was born there.

A posting to Creighton brought him back to Natal. Over 10 yrs he established Pine tree plantations and saw to the conserving of the indigenous forests. Transferred to Underberg in 1976 he oversaw the start of what was to become the Ukuhlamba Drakensberg Park. His enduring legacy was the construction of the now iconic Giants Cup Hiking Way. He ended his career as Chief Conservator at Cathedral Peak under the Natal Parks Board in 1988.

"Retiring" to Underberg he became involved in everything and was a member of: The Sani Wild Life Society branch of WESSA becoming a driving force, Chairing it many times. He received the Conservationist Award in 2009. As a member of the Garden Club he gave many talks on indigenous gardening and attracting wildlife. Together with his great friend Rob Guy they started the Sani to the Sea idea by walking it, at first in sections as places of interest then joining them together. This was then done over 10 days in stages, the first from Thabana- Ntlenyana in Lesotho, to St Josephine's bridge in the Umkomaas valley. The second from there to Scottburgh. As if this was not enough five of these pioneers decided to climb Mt Ruwenzori in Uganda. Bill the most senior was 69.

2024 as member of the local M.O.T.H.'s active 'Boot and Saddle Shellhole' he was invited by the Mayor of Cape Town to attend the Armistice Day Parade in the city. That year he was also invited as a dignitary to the inaugural re-opening of the renovated Sulenkama Hospital in the Transkei as the nephew of the Scottish Missionary Doctor Paterson who started the hospital. His family spent many holidays there in his youth.

Bill passed away peacefully in his home at Mountainairs, Underberg early on Saturday morning 21st June 2025, he was over 100 years old. His funeral at his Underberg Congregational church was well attended and celebratory. He leaves a daughter Helen, sons Wells and Phillip, eight grandchildren and three great grandchildren.





THE SANI PASS **GODFREY EDMON**

Godfrey was born and educated in Durban, and being a young adventurer joined the RAF at an early age when called upon, to go and serve for king and country.

Flying was his passion and on the 30th of May 1939 he began his flying training in a DH82 Tiger Moth, in Oxford UK, three months later he had converted to Oxford, Anson and Hampden aircraft. It was during a solo night flying exercise, that tragedy struck on the 4th of March 1940. Godfrey had German Measles at the time, and unbeknown to all, this caused night blindness. He took off from Hayford airfield in Oxford and once airborne and away from the runway lights, was unable to see the instrument panel in the darkness. He believed he was gaining height, and felt that his wings were level, unfortunately he flew into the side of a small hill on the adjoining farmlands.

The aircraft burst into flames, he managed to kick his way out of the bottom of the Anson aircraft that he was flying at the time. A farm hand by the name of W.H. (Bill) Kill of 5 Aston View, Somerton, Oxford, lived exactly opposite to where Godfrey had crashed. Bill ran down to the burning aircraft, dragged Godfrey from the wreckage and wrapped him in a blanket and sat with him until the ambulance had come to take him away. The next day Bill went to retrieve his blanket from the nearby hospital, and enquired who that pilot had been, he was told it was the South African Godfrey Edmonds, Bill never forgot that name.

Godfrey spent 19 months in hospital in East Grinstead, which was a specialised burn unit that was maned by Dr. Archibald McIndoe at





the time, who was later knighted for the work that he did on the burn victims. Remembering that this was pre-Penicillin days, and the only way to treat burns was to submerge patients into a saline bath. Through extensive skin grafting done by McIndoe, and after too numerous operations to mention, Godfrey's body was patched back together. He was recorded as one of the worst burnt pilots to survive the war and was a founder member of the Guinea Pig Club which was made up of all the burn victims from East Grinstead.

On the 10th of October 1941, and 19 months after his accident, he was back training again in a Tiger Moth, he went onto fly over 1000hrs in Anson, Oxford, Lysander 111, Whitley, Wellington, Defiant 1, Lancaster, Martinet, Proctor 111, Dominie, and Dakota aircraft. He was involved in amongst other things in the bombing of Dusseldorf and Berlin and It was only natural that he would be promoted to Flight Commander of his own airfield.

After the war he returned to Kokstad in East Griqualand with his Scottish wife Gladys who had sat by his bedside throughout his entire war ordeal. He joined his long-time friend in Stanley Motors, they were marketing the 4x4 Willy Jeep that had proved itself through out the war. This was specifically targeted at the farming sector, as the Jeep could do almost the same work as a small tractor.

Godfrey had a chance meeting with Brian Gray, the then District Commissioner of Mokhotlong, they got talking about the transport problems in the Lesotho mountains, and they decided to see if the Willy's Jeep could be used on the pass to solve these issues.

Godfrey being the great adventurer, and always ready to prove what these vehicles he was marketing could do, took on the challenge to drive up the Sani Pass.

On Tuesday 26th October 1948, history was made. Godfrey Edmonds became the first person ever, to ascend the Sani Pass in a motor vehicle. Accompanied by three travelling companions, the intrepid pioneer set off from Himeville at 07h25, bound for the first stop at the old Basotho police post. After refuelling and a brief rest, the party set off on the steep bridle path leading to the Sani top. Accompanied by a group of Basotho labourers, they made slow progress as numerous, treacherous hairpin bends slowed the group to crawling pace. After a backbreaking ordeal and having to bounce the Jeep around the hairpin bends, the victorious adventurers crested the Sani top almost three hours later, much to the astonishment of the local population! The final 60-kilometre drive inland meant crossing Black Mountain, which at 3200 meters is the

highest mountain range in Southern Africa. Exhausted, but elated, Godfrey Edmonds reached Mokhotlong twelve hours after starting out. The Sani Pass had been conquered!

Many years later, a documentary was aired on BBC TV on the history of the Guinea Pig club, and how these badly burnt service men had been treated by Sir Archie McIndoe. Godfrey Edmonds name was mentioned as being so badly burnt. W.H. (Bill) Kill remembered that name and wrote to the guinea pig club asking of Godrey's where abouts and for his contact details.

He wrote the most touching letter to Flight Commander Godfrey Edmonds who had retired and now lived in Merrivale, Tex and Anita Turton (Godfreys daughter who has lived in Underberg for over 40 years) were visiting at the time, they recall the tears rolling down Godfreys cheeks, as he read the letter aloud to the family.

Tex and Anita together with Hylton and Ruth Crouch (Mrs Tidy Town) were about to travel to the UK on vacation, Godfrey made them promise that they would make contact with Will Kill, this they did and in fact spent two nights with Will who was still living in the same small house. He who took great delight in recalling the events of that dreadful night on the 4th of March 1940 when he saved Godfrey Edmonds from the burning Anson aircraft. Godfrey died 48 years later on the 4th of March 1988, the anniversary of his accident.

FIRST ELECTRIC 4X4 UP SANI PASS On 16 July 2025 a new milestone was made in a kilometre world when

Richard Braby took the first four by four electric vehicle up Sani pass in a Riddara bakkie made in China for export to Thailand so there was no heater in the car but under the bonnet is a fiery 356-kilowatt engine that takes you from zero to 100 km/h in 4.5 seconds

People noticed the vehicle from its quiet and stealthy approach to the South African border post and the Sani Pass tour drivers could see the unusual undercarriage which showed nothing and then asked Richard to pop the bonnet to see the engine and admire Richard's new toy. The bakkie has a smaller size profile than others but the clearance handled the Sani Pass and did not bottom out and took the sharp corners in one go. There was snow and the ice was formed on the waterfalls but no ice on the road surface.

When we reached the Lesotho border post there people, and the one border official asked Richard how fast it accelerates, and Richard put foot and the 356-kilowatt engine that takes you from zero to 100 km/h in 4.5 seconds pushed me deep into my seat with the G forces generated. Wow ... time to exhale at high altitude which does not affect the performance of the electric motor. We drove all the way to black mountain at an altitude of 3240 meters. On the way back down, we checked how the accelerator held the vehicle back because it has no gears and then discovered there was an extra computer application that had to be activated which had a graphic of a vehicle on a downward incline.

We stopped for lunch and a Maluti beer at the Highest pub in Africa before the descent into South Africa and remembered that we must push the appropriate button again. The vehicle is a computer on wheels and like a computer you need to play with it to get to know how it works. Thanks for another great adventure, Richard from Paul Welch. BIRDING IN THE SOUTHERN KZN DRAKENSBERG

Creating a bird-friendly garden in the Southern KZN Drakensberg is a rewarding many of which are typically found in forests and riverine scrub. While the region is

often associated with harsh frost conditions, you don't need to be discouraged from planting indigenous plants. In fact, it's the smaller plants that can thrive here, offering both beauty and functionality to your garden.

If you're hoping to attract sunbirds, start with plants like Red-hot Pokers and Wild Dagga. These are favorites for a variety of sunbird species. For instance, the Malachite Sunbird, in particular, enjoys the late-flowering Wild Dagga as their chicks are transitioning to lower elevations for the winter months. The Red-hot Pokers are a hit in the summer, providing essential nectar for these vibrant birds.

Another great option for your garden is Aloe aristata, a frost-resistant Aloe that does well in both shade and sun. Its compact size makes it perfect for growing along rock crevasses, adding texture and colour while attracting sunbirds. The Fence Aloe, another hardy variety, can grow as a hedge or clump, making it a versatile option for creating a birdfriendly boundary. This will also attract the Gurney's Sugarbird, known for its distinctive call and elegant appearance.

For a more diverse approach, consider planting the Tree Fuchsia (Halleria lucida). Not only does this shrub provide nectar to various bird species, but its fruit-bearing branches are a magnet for fruit-eating birds like Robins, Bulbuls, Barbets, and Tinker-barbets. During our time in St Lucia, we even set up a hedge of Halleria and successfully ringed over 300 Olive Sunbirds for Digby Cyrus during moult studies. After flowering, the shrubs continue to offer bountiful fruit, drawing in a host of birdlife. Similarly, species of Searsia (formerly known as Rhus) are excellent choices for attracting birds. Their tassels of edible fruit are irresistible to many species. Varieties such as Searsia dentata, Searsia gerrardii, and Searsia krebsiana are all frost-resistant, making them ideal for our region. Another small, but valuable addition to any garden is the Glossy Leaf. This tree or shrub produces fruit that is favoured by the Bush Blackcap, among other bird species.

Buddlejas are another versatile shrub, easy to grow and known for attracting small insects that, in turn, attract insectivorous birds like the Fairy Flycatcher or various species of Warblers. In fact, even the larvae of burrowing beetles, often found on Buddleja plants, are a valuable food source for birds like the Cardinal Woodpecker. Buddleja auriculata, in particular, has a strong, pleasant scent, which also draws in butterflies. At times, you'll find that Cape Canaries and Swee Waxbills frequent the Buddleja shrubs, feasting on their seeds.

If you're looking for a tree with dual benefits, consider the Wild Peach (Kiggelaria africana). The female trees produce an abundance of capsules filled with edible fruit, which attracts a range of birds. While these trees also draw Garden Acraea butterflies (whose larvae become an essential food source for Cuckoos), the sighting of Cuckoos, which are otherwise hard to spot, is an added bonus for any bird enthusiast.

Grasses can also play an important role in your bird garden, though they require a bit more space to form a successful patch. Grasses like Panicum are particularly attractive to Waxbills and Bishops, who often feed on their seeds.

For those lucky enough to live in frost-free areas, attracting birds with plants is undoubtedly easier, but for those of us in colder regions, these hardy plants offer a simple and effective way to build a bird-friendly garden. These plants are common, easy to grow, and—most importantly serve as an inviting habitat for a wide variety of birds. By Stuart McLean

ABOUT TROUT FISHING IN UNDERBERG

The still - water season is in full swing, but with mixed reports coming in from all over. It seems that while most other Trout fisheries are fishing well, closer to home, although not bad, is still fishing a little slow with fewer than normal fish coming to the net. Reports from anglers fishing club water as well as private and resort water talk of difficult fishing. Some anglers believe we might be a little behind time

this year and good fishing still to come. I surely nope so too Some anglers reported good fishing in the area contrary to most other reports coming in. Talk of 7lb (3kg) fish from one of the resorts and some 5lb+ (2kg+) fish from another resort. As the season progresses more fish have been spotted in shallows mulling around and in spawn mode. This could also be some cause for the difficult fishing as these fish do not readily take a fly but can be tempted to strike at it out of aggression. By using the right techniques fish can still be caught. Although frowned on by many fly anglers, the use of egg patterns is a sure way to get some fish to the net. Fished static under an indicator seems to be the best method for fishing them. The fish that were brought to the net was predominantly caught on white or bright flies. Orange, Pink and White accounted for most of the fish caught. The usual natural-coloured flies (Leaches, Woolly Buggers, Mrs. Simpsons, Damsels) in olive and brown also caught some fish. Targeting the fish not actively spawning and still feeding it works well fishing smaller flies like Zebra midges, Pheasant tails, Gold ribbed hares' ear and other flies imitating pupae or midge larvae. These can be fished on tandem rigs and work very effective using a long leader fished "washing line" method where a couple flies are fished "hanging". This works well as multiple water columns can be fished at once. Club statistics show 33 fish caught

off 66 anglers. Some anglers getting more than 1 fish a session while others were struggling to bring fish to the net. Deville Wood in Underberg.

The centre of many small towns in South Africa have monuments which honour the fallen in innumerable wars. Mostly they're an obelisk of some sort with names, dates and descriptions. Himeville's is known as the cenotaph, a mortar like structure erected to commemorate local folk whose served and died.

The local M.O.T.H.S. are particularly dedicated to the cenotaph's upkeep opposite the Himeville Hotel. Erected after World war 1 it commemorates the fallen three wars are

Mathew Marwick's talk on the subject of Delville Wood recently brought it all home momentarily. It was well attended and I was stimulated to 'delve' further into the battle. 15th – 18th July 1915. James Bruce Little being Underberg's sole casualty is clearly represented on the centotaph. I thought to myself who else? There is a plaque in the museum grounds with a Mc lean soldiers name from Lotheni – died at Delville Wood 1915. There must have been some survivors from this district too. I recall a conversation I've had with Pat Eustace whose father was a prominent military man.

'These guys from the farm between Lotheni and Swartberg they rode down to Durban to join up, their grooms brought the horses back to the farms, most of them never returned.'

The internet provided some clues. A site called 'Roll Call Delville Wood' revealed much. Old Natal names are well represented. The names Crocker and Vinnicombe caught my attention. Privates Crocker and private J. Vinnicombe once farmed as nieghbours on the Ngwagwane. Errol Crocker a son 'or nephew' in his book 'Motherless son of Africa' published July 2010 mentions driving his father and John Vinnicombe Snr. to Underberg to attend M.O.T.H. meetings. Both are buried in the Underberg graveyard without any war citation.

I used to take Dad (Crocker) and Uncle Johnny (Vinnicombe) to M.O.T.H meetings in Underberg but on these occasions made sure not to drink alcohol. Dad and Uncle Johnny would consume a good deal though, and would tell fantastic war stories on the way home. It became a very satisfying for Dad to repay Uncle Johnny for all the fetching and carrying he had done for us over the years. In addition Dad looked happier and more relaxed with regular trips to the M.O.T.H. meetings. (I'm guessing the dates of these excursions were the 1950's.

The Vinnicombe and Crocker farms have changed hands, their history is mostly lost, but the most recent owners 'STUART FARMING' of West Isley found an old WW1 photograph unmarked with no names in a cupboard. Who knows this could bring further light to the lives of some Delville Wood survivors in the district.

I am reminded of the M.O.T.H.S. monotoned recital.

'Old soldiers never die - never die - they simply fade away...simply fade away.' For my part all this reading and research around the subject of Delville Wood yielded me a family surprise. A great uncle of mine Captain Leonard Warren Tomlinson (DS0) 3 SAI D Coy was decorated for actions at Delville Wood. The reference reads; During the taking of Dellville Wood, on the 15th July, he led raiding parties on a German trench in the eastern perimeter. After an attack with a bayonet, his party took prisoner 3 officers, 150 other ranks and brought back a machine gun. He was wounded and evacuated.

My Tomlinson side of family had a proud military tradition, DNA which was clearly erased in future generations.

"WATER LEAKS ACCOUNTS FOR NEARLY 26 PERCENT OF THE NATION'S UNACCOUNTED FOR WATER AND COSTS THE COUNTRY ABOUT 7 BILLION ANNUALLY." According to the Government Communication and Information System. (CGIS)

WATER LEAKS: A decade has passed since the "War on Water Leaks" was launched by the Department of Water and Sanitation, whereby 15 000 unemployed youth would be trained, and a budget was approved for R2.2 million. Last month, the SIU reported that this figure had ballooned to R4.7 million and they expect this figure to grow as investigations proceed due to fraud. On top of this, R1.1 billion in contracts and administrative decisions were believed to be invalid and thus subsequently dismissed, by the SIU. Once again, the rampant fraud in South Africa, has not only failed our unemployed youth, but deprived in some capacity, every resident in the country, of their constitutional right to water.

Nearer home, water leaks are reported via the local Water and Infrastructure Whatsapp Group and yet the Harry Gwala Municipality Plumbers do not treat these leaks with any urgency, nor do they entertain residents' constitutional rights to water. Threatening residents for interfering when leaks have not been attended to for weeks, is not a solution, but a dereliction of duty. Recently, a massive leak on Arbuckle Street had been reported for 3 weeks, but to no avail. Today, the plumbers arrived on a Friday and merely shut down the water, leaving a single mother with two children, one being a special needs child, without water. Why wasn't this resident afforded a tanker and given free water like the residents in the Low-Cost Villages are given? Residents in The Roses Complex went without water for a week with no communication from the powers that be, and yet no special delivery tanker was dispatched to assist them.

We pay for service delivery, the parameters of which are clearly set out in the Municipal Structures Act, and we are not receiving it. Rumours abound of the Municipality wanting to meet with residents individually regarding old, disputed debts. The Municipality remains blissfully unaware, or perhaps by choice, as regards a class action by residents against the Municipality that is pending, and therefore the Municipality is legally obliged to deal with the Sani Community Forum attorney on record, Leisha Van As Attorneys, and may not communicate directly with individuals.

COMMUNITY ASSISTANCE: Thanks must go to those supporting those in need in our community on so many levels or contributing with their time to assist so many outreach programs within our district. Sani Community Forum continues to distribute food parcels to those in need and recently teamed up with the NPO ESINAM FOUNDATION, conducted by the inspiring and dynamic, Ica Mbebe.

DEVELOPMENTS: Sani Community Forum recently submitted their objections as Interested and Affected Parties (I&AP) along with so many other residents and concerned citizens regarding the massive, planned development on the Sani Pass Road. Notwithstanding the gravity of all the Environmental concerns of a massive development in a World Heritage site buffer zone, we decided to leave that topic to those far more competent in this field. Thank you to everyone who is

fighting this 1000 bed development on the Sani Pass Road. Briefly, Sani Community Forum raised these points as I&AP.

*ESKOM is a huge problem in the area and in Himeville, in particular. Transformers cannot take the load as it is, and the power outages are frequent because of this. What is the plan for Eskom to provide for this development if the present demand cannot be accommodated by the inadequate infrastructure presently?

*What provision has been made for the construction vehicles and the host of additional vehicles if the Bulwer/Underberg is being resurfaced over the next 5 years as the Stop/Go interruptions are already a huge issue with the

*What contribution does the Premier Group make towards Tidy Towns and Sani Community Forum to clean up the towns, fix potholes, plant trees, open drains, paint murals, clear pavements, sort out water leaks, paint speedbumps, feed and clothe our destitute and general an action group that benefits our whole community? How and where do the Premier Group invest in our local community and support Community Groups if all purchases are made outside of Underberg?

*By their own admission, the SPH has a faulty Sewerage Plant. Surely this should be addressed immediately before further development is planned to indicate that they have a vested interest in preserving such an ecologically sensitive valley. If their sewerage system is faulty, with little interest to fix it on display, why would they be inclined to maintain anything new?

*The Municipality cannot even fix the potholes, and the community must step up to fix potholes from our own pockets as we have severe accidents and deaths due to drivers driving dangerously to avoid potholes. Our roads were not built for all this traffic and with the increase of heavy construction vehicles, this will cause massive damage to our already eroding roads and literally

*School kids walk from the Himeville Low-Cost Community to Faithway and Goxhill schools, along with Noah's Ark kids, along the Arbuckle Street Road. With the massive increase of traffic this will only increase the danger to these children walking on these roads. We have already had deaths from speeding and pothole dodging.

*There is already no accommodation in the two villages to accommodate the Road Construction teams and commercial growth in Underberg as it is, so where will all these SPH development people be accommodated? This development will encourage more squatters. We have zero accommodation to be had for tenants presently, so where will these additional numbers be housed,

It's in the quiet moments that a community shows its true face. The past few weeks in Underberg and Himeville have been full of movement and challenge. Another storm rolled over the region, the cold crept in, roofs shook. But in the end, it's not the weather we'll remember. It's the way people stood together when it mattered most.

One simple message on social media was all it took. No big campaign, just a gentle call. And not long after, the first loads of firewood started arriving. People who didn't wait to be asked. People who said, just come fetch some, take what you need. We share what we have. For us at Be Your Own Hero South Africa, that moment says everything. And just like that, the school holidays began. Not with packed bags or big trips, but with warm clothing, full tummies, and the quiet feeling that says, "someone sees me".

NVIDIA DAZZLES AGAIN WITH IT'S SHEER BRILLIANCE

This month Nvidia continued to write the greatest story in corporate history.

It became the first company to be worth 4 trillion dollars. And it hit this mark and continued its climb.

On Wednesday 25th June 2025 the company

Prior to the AI boom, Nvidia was mostly known for creating premium graphic cards that were used by gamers in high-speed visuals. Now the company is famous for



selling powerful chips that help chatbots such as Open AI's ChatGPT and self-driving cars. Nvidia powers more than 75% of the 500 most powerful computer systems in the world.

Nvidia sales increased 69% to \$44.1 billion in its fiscal first quarter compared to a year ago. Net income was nearly \$18.8 billion, up 26% from a year ago. In its fiscal year 2025, the company's revenue more than doubled to about \$130.5 billion compared to a year earlier, and net income increased 145% to nearly \$72.9 billion compared to fiscal year 2024.

Let us look at what happened last week. On Monday, the share price opened at \$163.94. It closed at \$164.28. At this level Nvidia was worth \$4.006 trillion. It closed the week at \$172.41 giving the company a value of \$4.205 trillion.

So, last week alone Nvidia added over 200 billion in market value – that is the same value as Shell Plc. But Shell was founded in 1833 near 200 years ago.

These numbers are difficult to explain. One billion dollars is 1000

million dollars. So, 200 billion is two hundred thousand million dollars. In language South African readers can understand and at an exchange rate of 17.71 Rands to a dollar that is three thousand five hundred and forty-two thousand million rand. I hope I have this right. I think it is . I am happy for readers to check the maths.

I suppose the point is, it is a lot of money to create in one week! And so, the incredible story of Nvidia continues to unfold.

Responsible Disengagement by Heidi Kyle

Disengaging from toxic people, particularly family members with narcissistic traits or gaslighting behaviors, requires courage and strategic planning. It's difficult when the toxic person is your child, spouse or other close family member. While family bonds are important, protecting your mental health sometimes means creating necessary distance from those who consistently harm your well-being

Narcissistic individuals often manipulate conversations, dismiss your feelings, and make everything about themselves. Gaslighters systematically undermine your reality, making you question your own perceptions and memories. When interactions consistently leave you feeling drained, confused, or emotionally wounded, disengagement becomes an act of self-preservation rather than selfishness.

Start with clear, consistent boundaries. Examples are: limit contact to specific occasions or timeframes. Use the "gray rock" method—become as uninteresting as possible during interactions by giving brief, neutral responses. This reduces the emotional fuel that feeds toxic dynamics without creating unnecessary drama.

When possible, avoid being alone with toxic individuals. Having

witnesses present often curbs their worst behaviors. If you must engage, prepare mentally beforehand and have an exit strategy ready, such as a pre-arranged appointment.

Family members may pressure you to "keep the peace" or maintain relationships "because they're family." Remember that being related to someone doesn't give them license to abuse you emotionally. You can acknowledge their pain or struggles without accepting their toxic behavior as your responsibility to endure or solve.

Document interactions when necessary, especially if gaslighting is involved. This helps you maintain clarity about what actually happened. Seek support from trusted friends, therapists, or support groups who understand toxic family dynamics.

Consider whether complete no-contact is necessary or if limited contact with strict boundaries suffices. Sometimes gradual reduction in engagement works better than abrupt cutoffs, depending on your situation and safety concerns.

Disengagement isn't about punishment—it's about self-care and realising you are not responsible for fixing toxic people or managing their emotions. By protecting your peace, you help create healthy boundaries and space for relationships that nurture rather than drain you.

Recovery takes time, but choosing your wellbeing over familial obligation is both brave and necessary for your long-term mental health, however guilt can be a problem that needs to be managed.

Drakensberg ready for Gran Fondo gravel riders

The hills of the Drakensberg are calling, with hundreds of riders set to tackle the foothills of the famous mountain range on Saturday July 26th in the annual Underberg Gran Fondo gravel cycle race.

This testing event is made up of three races – 140km, 90km and 41km – and is considered one of the most scenic events on the South African cycling calendar, with riders taking on the challenge under the spectacular backdrop of the uKhahlamba Drakensberg World Heritige Site

The 2024 champions, Team Drive Train Academy's Tyronne White and one of his trainees, Sanchia Malan from Index Property Solutions, are both expected be back to defend their titles.

The 140km event has built a reputation as a slickly organised, all-round test of gravel riding with riders preparing for a challenge from both their rivals as well as a route that provides a great test of all gravel riding skills.

The first half sees riders using their bunch-riding skills as they roll through the river valleys, and then are forced to test their strength on the first big climb at about 60 kays. The second half of the loop is undulating and those riders who have paced themselves and put in the hours in training benefit – particularly as the time ticks towards five hours for the leaders.

While the 140km event is the main race, competitors also have the option of an easier 90km race and a relatively short 41km.

The racing starts from 8am and all events start and finish at The Olde Duck restaurant just outside Underberg and follow the same route until first the 41km peels off and loops back to the start/finish. The 90km follows the same route as the long event for just over 60km, and just after the big climb out the Ngwangwane Valley, the riders split away and head back to Underberg. The 140km riders loop around and return through Himeville and then Underberg back to the finish. Written By: Tim Whitfield



and committee members, Bill was the chair of Sani Wildlife a number of times for many years and set high standards which the current committee endeavour to live up to! Whilst Bill and Alta did not start the Sani Pass Flower Walk, they were instrumental in its growth and success. Alta for many years did the bookings, and in a time before email and cell phones, this was a massive task! She did a lot of work behind the scenes.

Bill encapsulated what WESSA stands for - he was truly a man caring for the earth. Bill qualified as a forester and spent his working life in places as diverse as Zambia, Creighton, Cathedral Peak and Cobham. He was instrumental in creating so many of the paths in the Drakensberg and has a cave in the Vergelegen area named after him. He also was instrumental in setting up the 5 day Giants Cup Trail across the southern Drakensberg. Bill and Alta impacted on a wide variety of avenues of life in our district. Bill kept the WESSA flag flying high, and drove our local committee, ensuring a regular supply of interesting talks and outings. He tried hard to establish an environmental education centre in the area at the Good Hope site, but this never came to fruition. He stood firm against inappropriate development, whilst always keeping in mind the realities of a farming district and the need for earning a living and creating employment. A keen indigenous gardener, with his forestry background, he and Alta were advisors and mentors to many aspiring gardeners. Rock art was another of Bill's passions – he knew more sites than anyone I have ever met, and his memory of their content and exact location was staggering.

In 2016, Bill was honoured by WESSA during their 90th anniversary celebrations as one of 90 South African "Conservation Giants" at a ceremony held locally. He remained an honorary member of our committee in his later years, adapting to changing times as he followed minutes on a tablet. It was his innovative suggestion in 2015 which led to us establishing a program to offer courses to educators from the district at Umgeni Valley. Over time, this program has developed into our highly successful Eco-Champions competition. Bill's impact on Sani Wildlife and WESSA has been immense, and we are grateful for his many years of enthusiasm, drive and dedication. land after a nights grazing, on Andrew Gilson's Waterford farm. On examination of his damaged fences John had a lot more to say (unpublishable) about harsh realities. This wildlife costs him and his neighbour big time.

Actually, Eland are hunted by landowners in the district, there is a quota which, landowners hunter.

Nek area is being explored.' As hiking guides, we have our



Over the years I have had the good fortune to work with a number of vets. One who stands out was an Irishman named Seamus. He was typically Irish, broad brogue and all, who could charm a bird out of a tree. This was in the early pe computer days and we had record cards on which we wrote the dog or cat's details, the diagnosis and treatment

I started to notice a lot of cards for animals that Seamus had seen for the diagnosis had SBI written on them. I was puzzled and eventually said thim "Seamus, what is SBI?" He replied "Something Bad Inside '. Only an Irishman could have written this – although all vets have had similar feelings about puzzling cases (and I am sure our GPs too). He eventually left to go and help his father with the harvest, back in Ireland. Can you believe it – his father still preferred to go to the local bone setter rather than the local doctor for any medical problems?

Another vet who gave us a few laughs was Roger, who was newly married and very religious. He was a good vet who while in the army had been sent to Namibia which he loved. It was still in the days of the hand written record cards and I remember reading one for an aggressive dog where Roger had written:"The dog was very nervous, AND SO WAS THE VET!! "Again this is something all vets can understand and sympathize with.

It is not only big dogs that can be aggressive. Once the local

Kwanalu: FMD response must protect communal lands to commercial corridors KwaZulu-Natal's Foot and Mouth Disease (FMD) outbreak is tightening its grip on the province's livestock sector – impacting everyone from rural families selling a single animal to put food on the table, to established agribusinesses battling to keep export operations

The KwaZulu-Natal Agricultural Union (Kwanalu) has reiterated its call for provincial disaster declaration, and a coordinated and inclusive response – one that empowers all livestock owners to comply with disease control protocols, while ensuring no farmer is left without the support needed to survive.

"We are seeing intense pressure across the board. Some of the country's most established commercial operations are at risk of closure, while small-scale farmers face impossible choices between following the law and feeding their families," says Sandy La Marque, CEO of Kwanalu.

In many rural communities, the sale of a single animal is a family's only financial lifeline, but with movement restrictions in place, many find themselves caught between survival and legality. Kwanalu warns that unless urgent support mechanisms are introduced, including education, mobile permit access, a market within the DMA and veterinary services, compliance will remain out of reach for many.

'No farmer wants to break the rules, but the reality is that some are left with no choice. We must remove those barriers – not with judgment, but with practical help," says Angus Williamson, Vice President of Kwanalu and Chair of the Red Meat Producers Organisation.

The Union has welcomed recent government efforts to expand vaccine access across the province. The Minister of Agriculture has confirmed the arrival of additional vaccines, with plans for free distribution via State Veterinary Services in affected zones. Kwanalu says this must now be matched with on-the-ground coordination, particularly in communal farming areas where the outbreak continues to spread.

"Every corner of this sector is hurting. But if we work together commercial and communal, government and farmer – we can slow the spread and protect every player in the value chain," says PJ Hassard, President of Kwanalu.

The FMD crisis has led to export suspensions and production bottlenecks, particularly in affected zones - placing livelihoods, local economies, and the reputation of South African agriculture at risk. In affected commercial corridors, producers face mounting logistical and financial losses; from delayed exports to disrupted operations,

placing jobs and future viability at risk. In rural regions, they're felt in empty plates and school fees unpaid.

Kwanalu is calling for permit and veterinary support in rural areas. language-specific communication of protocols and best practices, and economic relief measures for affected producers of all sizes.

"Kwanalu is seeking solutions which are beneficial to all farmers." Agriculture in Kwazulu-Natal is the backbone of economic development, employment and growth and must be protected at all costs." La Marque concludes.
